















BUDGET BOOST for infrastructure, community

Fit for the future and ready to grow: Kyogle Council has announced the public display of its draft budget that sees improvements to vital infrastructure and provides for all sections of the community.

Kyogle Council Mayor Danielle Mulholland described the draft as a "budget for our future".

"Over the next four years we are investing more in our bridge replacement program, our rural road program and our regional road network program," Cr Mulholland said.

"The increased spend will see 50 bridges replaced and over \$28 million spent on improvements and resealing of regional and rural road infrastructure.

"Major road and bridge upgrades are scheduled, including substantial improvements to the Clarence Way and Culmaran Creek Road.

"There is additional funding for sealing of laneways and streets in Bonalbo, Woodenbong, Kyogle and the villages.

"We are also investing in building improvements allocating \$1.4 million over four years, and in community partnerships

with projects expected to attract 50 per cent external funding."

The budget also provides for continued local business assistance through the development of an economic prospectus.

"Kyogle Council recently convened a local business ideas forum and we have listened to our local business owners," Cr Mulholland said.

"We have committed to funding a prospectus and allocated additional funds to

update it in the future.

"We are also pleased to announce extended pool hours at Bonalbo and Woodenbong, flexible hours at Kyogle, and free use of the Kyogle Memorial Institute (KMI) Hall for community and not-forprofit groups."

Kyogle Council General Manager Graham Kennett said the budget also provided

Give a 'toss' and help REDUCE LITTER

Kyogle Council is reminding the community not to litter during March and April as part of a concerted effort to help promote the *Hey Tosser!* Campaign.

The *Hey Tosser!* Campaign aims to educate the public about litter, the impacts on the environment and encourage the local community to put their rubbish in a bin or take it with them.

Kyogle Council has been working to tackle litter. Council previously launched a project focused on reducing litter at community events in the local area. Through media coverage and placement of bins, a major reduction in the amount of litter observed was achieved.

Council's Manager of Environmental Health Services David Bell said littering was a damaging but preventable problem.

"We know the people of Kyogle want a clean and safe environment, so we are calling on locals to register to report littering from vehicles so that they can help us reduce littering in the Kyogle area," Mr Bell said.

As part of the *Hey Tosser!* Campaign Kyogle Council is encouraging local residents to use the Report to EPA system to report littering from vehicles.

"Since February 2015, more than 20,000 people across NSW registered with 'Report to EPA' to *Report Tossers* littering from vehicles. Over 26,000 reports of littering from vehicles were made, demonstrating that many members of the community care about keeping NSW clean

and safe for everyone to enjoy," Mr Bell

"By having local residents report
"Tossers' it sends a strong message that
littering is not tolerated in our community
and if you litter you will get caught."

To report littering from a vehicle you need to:

- have actually seen the litter being thrown, or blown, from the vehicle
- be able to provide the vehicle registration details and the location where the littering took place
- report the incident within 14 days
- make your report on the EPA website
- be willing to attend court as a witness, if required.

a significant investment in the future of the area's young people.

"It's important to invest in young local people and give them every opportunity to cement their future here in our Local Government Area," he said.

"I'm pleased to announce that we will be taking on graduates in Planning and Environmental Health, continuing to support apprenticeships and this budget provides for an ongoing local school-based trainee program."

Kyogle Taxis to trial new **BUS SERVICE**

Residents in Kyogle will have access to a new direct transport service to Lismore thanks to a project developed out of the Kyogle Public Transport Working Group.

The 'Bush Turkey Express', which is a new initiative from Kyogle Taxis and Hire Cars, will run on a 12 week trial basis every Wednesday and Thursday from 19 April 2017, leaving Kyogle from outside Peter's Food Hall at 7.40am to arrive in Lismore at 8.25am.

The service, which was launched at the Kyogle Transport Information Day, will run a return service from Lismore at 5.30pm and drop off at 6.15pm.

Developed out of Kyogle Council's Public Transport Working Group's community survey, the service will connect with existing services from Lismore and open new employment and education opportunities for the Kyogle community.

Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Danielle Mul-

holland has welcomed the new public transport option.

"It will benefit a broad cross section of people who have limited transport options," Cr Mulholland said.

Kon Papadopoulos from Kyogle Taxis and Hire Cars said the service would provide a much-needed boost for the town.

"Kyogle has been crying out for more public transport services. So when the idea was raised through the Kyogle Public Transport Working Group we felt we were in a position to deliver this essential service for the community, he said.

"This service will connect with other services leaving Lismore, meaning places like Byron Bay and Ballina will become accessible to our community.

"What we heard through the survey is that there was a real desire for services that would allow people to attend TAFE or gain employment. This service will do that."

Mr Papadopoulos said he hoped to extend the service to other weekdays over time, however, that would be dependent on community support and funding.



Kon Papadopoulos from Kyogle Taxis and Hire Cars will run the Bush Turkey Express between Kyogle and Lismore every Wednesday and Thursday.

The service will operate on a booking system with limited seats available. Tickets will cost \$7.50 each way.

FLOODS delay works program

Council's works program has been interrupted by the heavy rain and flooding which occurred at the end of March.

The large amount of damage to roads and bridges infrastructure resulted in the Kyogle local government area being declared a natural disaster area.

Four bridges were destroyed in the floods: McClellands Bridge at Barkers Vale; Collins Creek Bridge on Collins Creek Road; Robothams Bridge on Williams Road; and Hogans Bridge on Sawpit Creek Road.

Since the event, Council staff have carried out inspections of all roads in the local government area and documented the damage to roads, bridges and causeways with photographs and reports.

The list of damage is being used to prepare a revised works program with priority given to ensuring the travelling public's safety and prevention of further damage to infrastructure.

Temporary bridges have been constructed at McClellands Road and Collins Creek Road and a detour has been constructed, with permission from National Parks and Wildlife Service, through the Border Ranges National Park to provide access to isolated properties on Sawpit Creek Road.

Now that work is complete, bridge works have recommenced with replacement of bridges with culverts on Roseberry Creek Road.

Due to the interruption caused by weather conditions and the flood event, works are about six weeks behind schedule on the two Gradys Creek

Road bridges Council is currently working on replacing.

Once the revised works program is developed, Council will provide an update on the Gradys Creek and Lions Road Bridge Replacement Program.

Grading priorities after the flooding have been the badly affected Collins Creek Road, Horseshoe Creek Road, Proctors Road and Gabal Road.

When grading of these roads is complete, the crews will resume Council's original program, starting with the Hillyards Road area and rural roads around Woodenbong.

Construction also will resume then on the Wiangaree Back Road rehabilitation and sealing of Dam Access Road.

Working dog statue **UNVEILED**

"From a good idea to a stunning bronze statue in just under a year, it has been an amazing run."

That's how Sharon Tucker, co-ordinator of the Bonalbo Working Dog Statue project, described the grassroots movement to build a statue to commemorate Bonalbo as the birthplace of working cattle dog trials in Australia 67 years ago. The first cattle dog trial was held at the Bonalbo Show in 1950.

The statue also honours the role of the working dog in rural life.


Located in Patrick McNamee Anzac Memorial Park, Bonalbo, the statue was unveiled on Saturday 8 April by Fraser Ramsey, an original member of the show committee which ran the first dog trial.

Almost 300 people attended the unveiling, including the sculptor who created the bronze statue Catherine Anderson, of Boonah.

Bonalbo Show Society President David Whitney chose a special rock from his property as the plinth for the statue. The plinth is big enough for people to sit next to the dog and have their photograph taken.

Funding for the statue started with small local donations, raffles and market stalls. The project forged ahead when Federal Member for Page Kevin Hogan announced a Stronger Communities grant to match a donation from the Northern Co-operative Meat Company.

It became a reality after Kyogle Council, led by Mayor



Danielle Mulholland, threw its support behind the project.

"I keep talking about the results you can get when different levels of government work together with communities - this is a great example and a fantastic outcome for Bonalbo," Cr Mulholland said at the unveiling ceremony.

"It may be the start of bigger and better things."





Flood damage hits \$10 million

Kyogle Council's damages bill for the March flood has hit \$10 million.

Four bridges were washed away, many more were damaged, and there was wide-spread damage to the Council's rural road network including numerous landslips.

The floodwaters also inundated homes and businesses in the low lying areas of The Flats and the Kyogle central business district.

"The Richmond River flood level peaked at 15.95m at Wiangaree and 17.5m at Kyogle, making the flood the second largest on record since the devastating 1954 flood," Council's General Manager Graham Kennett said

"The newly constructed flood levee and spillway in Kyogle passed its first true test with flying colours.

"The new flood mitigation structures provided the additional warning time and safe evacuation route that they were designed to provide, as well as reducing the velocity of flood waters through the township, minimising damages.

"The off-stream water storage



dam also proved its worth, with the stored water remaining untouched by flood waters.

"This meant that Kyogle had a clean water supply while the Richmond River remained turbulent, saving Council and the community the cost and health risks associated with treating dirty flood water."

Council staff have worked seven days a week to restore access to residents isolated due to flood damage.

Council staff and emergency services also assisted floodaffected residents and groups in the clean-up after the flood.

Council would like to thank staff for their efforts and the

Kyogle SES, Kyogle Fire and Rescue Brigade, and the Kyogle Rural Fire Services volunteers for their help during the floods and with the clean-up.

Thanks also to the volunteer support service groups such as the Red Cross, Lions, CWA, ADRA, and community members who manned the evacuation centres in Woodenbong, Wiangaree and Kyogle and operated a pop-up Disaster Information Welfare Centre in the shop front of the Kyogle Memorial Institute Hall after the flood.

"The flood has caused serious problems and major damage across a wide area, but with the continued help and support of the community and the commitment and dedication of Council staff, we will get through this together," Mr Kennett said.

A Natural Disaster declaration has been made for the Kyogle Local Government Area, meaning Council and some flood-affected residents will be able to access disaster assistance funding through the jointly-funded Commonwealth-State Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (NDRRA).

IT'S SHOW TIME

It's show time in the Upper Clarence. The 89th annual Bonalbo Show will be held on Friday 28 April and Saturday 29 April, with the Woodenbong Show to follow on Sunday 30 April.

Friday's program at Bonalbo will include working cattle dog trials and the judging of the pavilion exhibits, while on Saturday there will be a two-ring horse program, bush pony and sporting events, Olympic jumps, heavy horses, pen and led cattle, show dogs and poultry competitions.

Pond Apple found on North Coast

The class 1 noxious weed, Pond Apple (*Annona glabra*), has been detected on the Far North Coast of NSW.

Regarded as one of Australia's worst weeds, it has been classified as a Weed of National Significance due to its invasiveness, potential for spread, and economic and environmental impacts.

The weed has already had devastating effects on the wet tropic bio-

region of Far North Queensland where it has invaded more than 2,000 hectares of environmentally valuable mangrove forest.

Pond Apple is a member of the Annonaceae family and shares the same genus (*Annona*) as Custard Apple, Soursop and Cherimoya,

and was originally introduced as a rootstock for these commercially valuable exotic fruits.

The tree is distinguishable by its 20-30mm diameter creamy-white to light-yellow flower, and its fruit, which is similar to a smooth-skinned Custard apple, is 50-150mm in diameter and contains around 140 pumpkin-like seeds.
