## Levee, floodway will reduce **FLOODING RISK**

Scores of people were given a guided tour of Kyogle's new flood works and off-stream water storage dam last month following the opening of the \$1.8 million flood mitigation project.

Member for Lismore Thomas George officially opened the flood mitigation works on Thursday 30 June.

The works included the construction of a 600 metre levee and a flood break-out channel.

Council's Director of Assets and Infrastructure Services told the 50 plus community members on the guided tour that the levee would reduce the risk of flooding in The Flats, protecting the area and its 65 homes and 12 commercial and industrial properties from a one in 10 year flood.

It would also give people living and working in The Flats an extra three hours warning time in the event of a major flood.

As part of the guided tour, the community members walked across the new flood break-out channel, which will allow floodwaters from Fawcetts Creek to flow direct-

Member for Lismore Mr Thomas George and Kyogle Council Deputy Mayor Cr John Burley officially launched the flood mitigation project.

After the launch, Council's Director of Assets and Infrastructure Services Mr Graham Kennett conducted tours of the site. The tours were well attended.

Council will have further opportunities to conduct similar tours of major projects for community members in the future.

I have greatly enjoyed the last three years as your mayor. I thank Councillors, Council staff and residents for their support and I wish all candidates the best of luck in the upcoming local government elections.

## Pet owners urged to act **RESPONSIBILY**

Council in the past few months has received a number of complaints about dogs being brought into the Saturday markets, in particular around the food areas.

To ensure the comfort, safety and health of the whole community, the Companion Animals Act places certain responsibilities on pet owners.

Here is a brief summary of the responsibilities of dog owners under the Act:

If your dog is in a public place, it must be under the effective control of a competent person by means of an adequate chain, cord or leash that is attached to that person.

If your dog defecates in a public place, it is an offence not to remove the faeces.

Dogs are prohibited in:

- Children's play areas
- Food preparation/indoor consumption areas
- Recreations areas,
- Public bathing areas
- School grounds and child care centre
- Shopping areas



• Wildlife protection areas.

To ensure that we all get along, people should always consider their neighbours when they own a dog.

Here are a few matters for consideration.

As a dog owner you will need a suitable yard that is securely fenced as you must take all reasonable precautions to prevent your dog(s) from escaping

Barking is one of the ways that dogs

communicate, but excessive barking may be very annoying, and can be prevented. Some things to consider are:

- Can the dog see other people or dogs walking about?
- Does the dog have enough room to move?
- Is it getting enough exercise?
- Is it seeking attention?
- Is it lonely?

ly into the Richmond River up to a one in 100 year flood.

Mr Kennett said the break-out channel would reduce the volume of floodwater backing up into the Fawcetts Creek floodplain and lessen the risk of Fawcetts Creek being overtopped.

The flood mitigation works were undertaken in conjunction with Kyogle's \$8.2

million water augmentation project which included the construction of Kyogle's off-stream water storage dam.

The turkey's nest dam will hold 200 mega litres of water when full and will give Kyogle residents a sustainable, secure water supply now and into the future.

The flood works were funded on a 4:1 ratio (4 State Government: 1 Council) under the NSW Government's Floodplain Management Program. The Office of Environment and Heritage also provided significant technical advice to Council during the development of the concept

design of the levee and breakout channel.

Meanwhile, Council would like to thank the residents of The Flats for their cooperation and patience while they have dealt with the construction works over the last year.

Stock wandering on roads and even streets has become a problem for the community once again.

Council has received numerous complaints over the past month regarding the matter, which can present a serious safety issue for road users.

People visiting properties are reminded that if you have to open a gate to enter the property, please close it behind you.

Council recently responded to an incident where cattle were wandering on streets within Kyogle and near a school.

Council also asks stock owners to please check their fences and gates to make sure that they're in good working condition.

With a very small regulatory team, Council allocates considerable resources to stock on roads. Where there is a recurrent problem and sufficient information is available, Council has the option of issuing penalties for offences, and has done so in the past.

### Council supports youth FILM FESTIVAL

Kyogle Council's economic development section has sponsored local schools in the REC Ya Shorts Youth Film Festival.

Open to young people aged 12-25, REC Ya Shorts Youth Film Festival provides more than 40 free "how to make a film" workshops at schools and education campuses across Northern NSW.

It also will feature a regional screening tour of the finalists' films, providing young filmmakers the opportunity to see their short films up on the big screen with their friends, families, and peers.

"Council is delighted to give students from Kyogle High School, Bonalbo and Woodenbong Central Schools and Kyogle



Youth Action the opportunity to showcase their creative talents," Mayor of Kyogle Council Cr Danielle Mulholland said.

With the theme of the short films 'adventure', it is hoped the Kyogle and Villages Visitor Information Centre can use some of the footage for promotional opportunities.

The REC Ya Shorts Youth Film Festival was held for the first time last year and has now grown to cover six local government areas in regional NSW: Clarence Valley, Coffs Harbour, Kyogle, Nambucca Valley, Bellingen Shire, and Kempsey Shire council.

The festival provides new opportunities for young people to capture their stories and showcase their talents through filmmaking.

Film making workshops were held at Kyogle High School, Bonalbo Central School, and Woodenbong Central School in mid-July as part of the festival.

"This is a very exciting opportunity for our youth and I am looking forward to the end results," Cr Mulholland said.

No date has been set for the screening of the short films, however Growing Kyogle and the Kyogle Community Cinema have jumped at the opportunity to assist the project with screening the students' films.

### Bonalbo rounds up Statue funds

Bonalbo is to get a statue of a working cattle dog to ensure the town is forever remembered held at Bonalbo on 4 July to as the birth place of the sport of cattle dog trialling.

A campaign, led by Bonalbo local Sharon Tucker, to raise the money to build the statue reached its target last month thanks to a donation from the Northern Co-operative Meat Company and a Federal Government Stronger Communities Grant.

Now all that's to be decided is the pose of the dog for the statue, which will be erected at Patrick McNamee Anzac Memorial Park.

Mrs Tucker said a meeting finalise plans for the statue attracted "lots of spirited support and discussion of poses".

Following the meeting Boonah-based sculptor Catherine Anderson agreed to create a miniature of the statue to present to the next planning meeting.

but with cattle - began at the Bonalbo Show in 1950 and was the brainchild of local cattle producers who wanted a means to showcase the skills of their working dogs.

Cattle dog trials have been

held at the show ever since and the sport has spread nationally.

Mrs Tucker hopes the statue will become a tourist attraction that is as well-known as the Dog on the Tuckerbox at Gundagai or Red Dog in WA.



# TABULAM to get a SKATE PARK

Tabulam is to get a skate park.

Kyogle Council has received a grant of \$20,000 to build the skate park which is expected to cost \$62,000.

Kyogle Council will kick in \$40,000 towards the project and the Tabulam Chamber of Commerce \$2,000.

Council plans to build the skate park on Council-owned land adjacent to the existing amenities building in Clarence Street

An existing unused concrete tennis court will be converted to a skate park using pre-cast concrete components

based on a design developed in consultation with the local youth.



This unused tennis court at Tabulam is to be transformed into a skate park for the young people of the town and surrounding districts.

As part of the project, the existing fencing will be modified to ensure the remaining tennis court is fully enclosed and separated from the skate park.

The skate park has been high on the priority list for the local community for some time, and has strong support from the school, the Chamber of Commerce, the Jubulum Local Aboriginal Land Council, and a host of other individuals and organisations.

Work on the skate park is expected to start in September and be finished by December.

## Outdoor gym accessible by all

There were smiles all round at the opening last month of the Kyogle's outdoor accessible gym.

The gym in Anzac Park is a joint initiative of Kyogle Council and Ability Links (a disability inclusion program delivered by the Northern Rivers Social Development Council from Grove House, Kyogle).

Built with the help of a NSW Sport and Recreation Grant, the gym can be used by most people including those in wheel-chairs and scooters or who use other mobility aids.

Ability Links and Council worked closely with people with mobility challenges to choose the gym equipment and select a site for it.

The gym links up with the existing shared footpath and cycleway network adjacent to the park, and to other facilities in the park including netball courts, children's playground, barbecue area, skate park, pic-

nic tables and shelters.

The joint project also included a program whereby a number of local community members with severe injuries from motor accidents were shown how to use the equipment and given training regimes.

The gym and a mosaic created by Ability Links clients to celebrate the gym's construction were opened by Mayor of Kyogle Council Cr Danielle Mulholland and Member for Lismore Mr Thomas George.

The statistics of food waste are concerning with one in five shopping bags of groceries thrown away in Australia. Families with children are one of the top three wasters of good food.

The *Love Food Save Money* workshops provide an opportunity to remind families of the importance of meal planning, shopping to a list, checking the fridge and pantry before shopping, good storage practices and serving smaller portion sizes (particularly to children with variable appetites).
