Communities throughout the Kyogle Council area will come together on Monday, 26 January, to celebrate Australia Day 2015 and honour the area's many unsung heroes.

Official events will be held at Kyogle, Woodenbong and Bonalbo and will feature a host of activities including a pop up Choir and Indigenous smoking ceremony at Kyogle, the annual city versus country cricket match at Woodenbong and a mechanical bull ride at Bonalbo.



Based on feedback from the community, Council has resolved to apply for a rate increase through IPART.

The propsed rate increase is 22% above the pegged rate limit over five years. IPART will announce its decision in May. As soon as we



know, you will know. The rate increase is tied into our Council's ability to be sustainable or 'Fit for the Future' so we appreciate your support and feedback.

The demographics of the Kyogle LGA are changing with some newcomers arriving but much to my dismay, not staying.

Trust Board

Kyogle Council is looking for people to be part of a community-based advisory committee (CBAC) to manage Council-controlled crown land in the local aovernment area. Applications for positions on the advisory committee are being sought from community members who have experience or an interest in Trust Reserves. good communication skills, can work co-operatively to resolve conflict and find solutions and have established positive community networks and relationships. Membership of the CBAC will comprise a maximum of nine people. Membership will be by nomination from the community and applicants who are (or have recently been) on a Crown Reserve Trust Board in the Kyogle LGA would be viewed positively. Membership will reflect locations of the crown reserves under the care. control and management of the Gateway to the Rainforest Reserve Trust (GTRR Trust). This may not be across the entire LGA. The CBAC members must be able to demonstrate expertise across any of the four key values of Crown Land - conservation. economic, recreation and social. The nine members will meet 2-3 times a year at

Kyogle Council Chambers and will be appointed for a period of two years. Appointments will be made by the GTRR Trust. If you are interested, you are asked to read the Gateway to the Rainforest Reserve Trust Terms of Reference (available on Council's website) and familiarise yourself with the requirements of the position and then submit a maximum two-page written submission to Kyogle Council either by email - council@kyogle.nsw. gov.au - or mail PO Box 11 Kvoale NSW 2474. Mulch Sale Suspended

Due to new State laws, the sale of mulch at the Kyogle landfill has been temporarily suspended.

The move comes after the NSW Government identified contaminated mulch as a problem in the spread of weeds, plant disease and other contaminants.

As a result, the Protection of the Environment Operations (Waste)



Regulation 2014 was passed, which requires producers of mulch in NSW to produce it in such a way that greatly reduces the risk of contamination. That means that green waste brought to the Council's waste facilities must now be chipped, then 'pasteurised' for a period of time in a designated area before it can be used as mulch

off-site. The process is regulated by the NSW EPA. There are substantial costs associated with setting up the correct process and Council is currently determining whether the process is viable to operate.

However, it is hoped that residents and Council will be able to use mulch produced at its waste facility sites again.

Busting Recycling Myths

Let's bust those common recycling myths once and for all and make sure everyone knows how easy it is to recycle these days:

Myth 1: Recycling wastes water because I have to wash and rinse out all my containers before recycling them.

BUSTED: OH NO YOU
DON'T: there is no need to
wash out your containers
or bottles. Just get rid of
any leftover food/drink
(compost or green bin
it preferably) and place
loose in your recycling

bin. If you want to be a water-saver, recycling is a major way of doing so. For example, making paper from recycled fibre uses half the energy and 90% less water than manufacturing paper from virgin pulp http://www.sd.fm.uwa.edu.au/programs/recycling/paper/facts.

Myth 2: Lids, labels – way too much work for me to remove.

BUSTED: There is no need to remove lids or labels anymore. New recycling technology means that these will be removed in the recycling process. So now it's super easy to be a super recycler.

Myth 3: All of our recycling

goes to landfill anyway – I saw it on the TV...

BUSTED: NO WAY! It costs
Council more money
to bury waste than to
recycle it, so it just would
not make any financial
sense to do that in our
region. There may have
been instances in the past
where a waste contractor
illegally dumped
recycling, but with
new state government
legislation in place those
instances are a thing of
the past.

Parking near School Zones

As the summer holidays draw to a close and families get ready to start the new school year, Kyogle Council has warned motorists that they must take care when dropping off and picking up children in a School Zone. In particular, motorists are asked to please take note of the following (infringements may result in demerit points being deducted from your license):

- No parking and drop-off zones 8.30-9.30am and 3-4pm.
- You must drop-off or pick-up children within 2 minutes
- You cannot leave your vehicle
- No waiting in zone
- Disobey No Parking sign \$173 and 2 demerit points
- Disobey No Stopping sign School Zone \$311 and 2 demerit points
- Stop near pedestrian crossing School Zone \$415 and 2 demerit points
- Stop on footpath (eg under trees) \$173 and 2 demerit points
- Stop in a Bus Zone School Zone \$311 and 2 demerit points

NO WARNINGS will be given as this is a major child safety issue. For further information, contact Kyogle Council on 6632 0293.

Pedestrian Safety

Children need assistance dealing with the traffic environment until at least the age of 10 as they are not equipped physically or developmentally to make the crucial decisions to keep themselves safe. Like learning to drive a car, children need practise and experience to walk in the traffic environment.

Children are vulnerable road users. Anywhere where there is a potential for moving vehicles is a potentially dangerous traffic situation for children. This includes residential areas, car parks, traffic lights,



along footpaths,zebra and other crossings, driveways, quiet streets and busy streets. Children may think they can handle crossing a road by themselves, but children:

- are easily distracted and focus on only one aspect of what is happening
- are smaller and harder for drivers to see
- are less predictable than other pedestrians
- cannot accurately judge the speed and distance of moving vehicles
- cannot accurately predict the direction sounds are coming from
- are unable to cope with sudden changes in traffic conditions
- do not understand abstract ideas such as road safety
- are unable to identify safe places to cross the road
- tend to act inconsistently in and around traffic

Many children below the age of 10 years do not have the capability or judgement to handle many pedestrian situations. Children need to be accompanied and closely supervised by a parent or adult carer to keep them safer.

Parents and caregivers have a key role in educating their children about road safety. Children learn about road safety largely by experience.

Parents and adult carers have opportunities in day-to-day routines to discuss road safety with children on the way to the newsagent, local shop or going to school. Whenever crossing roads, it is an idea to talk about when and why it is safe to cross the road with your children so they gain a good understanding of road safety issues. Annual Report



The 2013-2014 financial year was a busy one for Kyogle Council.
While roads and bridges once again topped Council's priority list, the council made noteable achievements across all of its service areas. Some of Council's achievements included:

- A detailed inspection of all 208 timber bridges was undertaken involving visual and mechanical processes.
 The information obtained has been used to produce a prioritised, bridge by bridge, treatment program and associated costings.
- Six timber bridges were replaced with concrete pipe culverts.
- Five timber bridges were replaced with concrete bridges.

- Clarence Way from Boomi Creek to Urbenville was reconstructed and widened.
- Two kilometres of Ettrick Road was reconstructed and widened.
- Over \$3 million of work was undertaken on state government roads on behalf of RMS.
- The Kyogle Comprehensive Development Control Plan was finalised.
- Council awarded the contract for construction of a weighbridge at the Kyogle Landfill:
- Council received EPA funding for an events-based Litter Reduction Campaign (\$65,000) and Community Recycling Centre for Kyogle landfill (\$104,000).
- Council organised and hosted the Fresh Ideas for Farm Productivity seminar.
- Pre-construction work associated with flood modification works (levee bank and flood breakout channel) in Kyogle moved forward, with the detailed design and specifications completed ready for calling

- tenders and agreements in place for the creation of easements on the affected private properties.
- Removal and replacement of the asbestos flooring at the Kyogle Pre-school in partnership with the community funded preschool committee.
- Installation of new solar hot water systems at the three swimming pool complexes, which previously only had cold showers. The works were funded by the Australian Government under its Local Government Energy Efficiency Program
- Completion of the construction of the new car park in Anzac Park adjacent to the skate park.
- Completion of the investigation into the feasibility of sewering the villages of Wiangaree, Mallanganee, Tabulam and Old Bonalbo.
- Upgrades to the chemical dosing and storage systems at the Kyogle, Woodenbong and Bonalbo swimming pool complexes.

Asbestos Awareness

Kyogle Council residents have been warned to be "asbestos aware" when carrying out work on their homes.
One in three Australian homes are estimated to contain asbestos.
In particular, homes built before 1987 are likely to

contain products made from bonded asbestos.
While most people know that asbestos was included in fibro sheeting in walls and ceilings, few people realise that it was also commonly used in water drainage and flue pipes, roofing and guttering and the backing of floor coverings including carpet.

Peter Dunphy Chair of the Asbestos Education Committee says it's vital that people get to know asbestos and where it is likely to lurk in homes.

"If you find asbestos in your home; Don't cut it; Don't drill it; Don't sand it; and don't water blast it," he advised. In NSW, a homeowner can legally remove up to 10m² (or 3 sheets of fibro sheeting) without engaging a contractor, as long as the site is not a worksite and correct safety procedures are engaged.

When it comes to disposal of asbestos, Kyogle Council homeowners can take

advantage of reduced disposal costs of up to 50% at Kyogle Landfill until 30 June 2015.
