LEP Amendments

Kyogle Council wants you to have your say on the proposed amendment to the 2012 Local Environmental Plan to allow rural boundary adjustments and split zoning subdivision. Council has resolved to amend the Kyogle LEP to permit adjustment of boundaries between adjoining rural properties where one or both of the new lots will not meet the minimum lot size specified in the LEP.

The proposed amendment

will allow owners of existing rural lots to carry out boundary adjustments with adjoining lots where this will result in improved land use and farm management outcomes. The current LEP provisions relating to minimum lot size for rural lots may also restrict the subdivision of certain lots with split zoning (eg, residential and rural). The proposed amendment includes a clause to provide for subdivisions in this instance.

The proposed amendment is on public exhibition from 12 March until 11 April 2014 and Council is seeking feedback from the community during this time.

The LEP amendment and supporting documents can be inspected at Council's administration building at 1 Stratheden St, Kyogle or on Council's website www.kyogle.nsw.gov.au.

Maintenance and Construction Works

The first of the two East of the Range maintenance grading crews has completed work in the Findon Creek area and will move on to Lavelles and Roseberry Creek Rds. The second East of the Range grading crew has completed its works in the Dyraaba area and is moving to Boorabee Creek Rd and will continue in the Back Creek area. The West of the Range crew is working on Bulmers Rd having finished its work in the Tabulam area on Rodgers, Racecourse and Jacksons Flat Rds. Construction works on Ettrick Rd on the far side

of the range are nearing completion.

The crew will then start work on Kyogle Rd on the eastern side of Cawongla. The jetpatcher has been working on the Summerland Way and Grady's Creek and is now moving to Collins Creek Rd.

Pothole repairs have been completed on the Clarence Way and the Mount Lindsay Rd.
Roadside slashing has been completed on Kyogle, Gradys Creek and Wiangaree Back Rds and is continuing in the Woodenbong area. Slashing has also started on Bentley Rd.
Bridge construction works

are progressing well on the replacement of two timber bridges -- one on Toonumbar Rd and the other on Yabbra Rd.
Following some expert advice we have been forced to close the timber truss bridge over Minneys Creek on the unsealed section of the Clarence Way south of the Bruxner Highway.

The closure had to be put in place at short notice and Council apologises for any inconveniences. Council is currently exploring its options for the bridge but in the meantime there is a detour in place is via Plains Station Rd.

Lions Road Time Trial

Organisers of the proposed Lions Road time trial event presented the overview of their proposed event at Council's meeting on March 10.

The event organisers are expected to begin formal consultation with affected residents within the next few weeks. The initial stage of the consultation will involve a letter box drop of information about the proposed motorcycle event to residents living in the areas that will be affected by the proposed road closures. The organisers have also advised that they will be looking to meet with local organisations whose support may be needed for the co-ordination of the event, such as the Chamber of Commerce.

Modelled along similar lines to the famous Isle of Man time trial, the proposed Lions TT would travel a 40km route starting from Rathdowney to Ripples On The Creek at Gradys Creek.

The route would traverse Running Creek Road and then head onto the Lions Road. Organisers say the route would have to be closed off to all traffic at times during the event, however provision would be made for some local traffic movements during the days of the event. The seven-member not-for-profit group putting the event together comprises sports marketing professionals, accountants and high profile sports men including swimmer Keiran Perkins and motor cyclist Cameron Donald. Chairman Casey Stringfellow said any profits generated by the event would be put back into improving the Lions Road and surrounding areas.

"By the very nature of running an event on the Lions Road annually and finishing



the event in Kyogle, there is a great economic benefit opportunity for the town of Kyogle and its constituents," he said.

Mr Stringfellow said the organising group was determined to develop an event that minimised disruption to land owners and maximised regional benefit.

The organisers are hoping to run the event for the first time over the October long weekend in 2014, with plans to then run the event on an annual basis.

Mr Stringfellow said the first event would demonstrate the viability of the Lions TT concept and help to set effective protocols and processes to ensure event safety, enjoyment and economic benefit into the long term.

Traffic Sign Guidelines

Thousands of children are injured or killed on NSW roads every year. To ensure that no child is hit by a car when going to or from school in the Kyogle local government area, the council is urging everyone to take extra care when driving and parking in school zones. Motorists are uraed to make sure they and their children understand the road rules. People should be aware that if they break the traffic rules in a school zone they are actually puttina children at risk. Parking and traffic rules around our schools are there to protect children. Anyone breaking the rules may be fined. Below is a quick quide to some of the most commonly misunderstood traffic rules.

No Stopping What does it

mean? You cannot stop in this area FOR ANY REASON. Why is it there? To keep sight lines clear for drivers and children so both have more time to avoid crashes. Penalty \$304 + 2 demerit points (School Zone).

No Parking
What does it
mean? You can

stop in a NO PARKING zone for a maximum of two minutes to drop off and pick up passengers. You must stay within three metres of your vehicle at all times. Why is it there? To provide a safe place for older children to be set down and picked up without endangering other children. Penalty \$169 + 2 demerit points (School Zone).

Bus Zone

What does it mean? You must not stop or park in a bus zone unless you are driving a bus. Why is it there? To provide a safe place for large buses to set down and pick up school children. Penalty \$304 + 2 demerit points (School Zone).

Pedestrian Crossings

You must not stop within 20 metres before a pedestrian crossing or 10 metres after a crossing unless there is a control sign permitting parking. Why is it there? To ensure that children can be clearly seen by vehicles approaching the crossing. Penalty \$405 + 2 demerit



Driveways

You may stop over the entrance of a driveway to pick up or set down passengers, but you may not wait there or leave

your vehicle unattended. Penalty \$169 + 2 demerit points (School Zone).

Footpaths and nature strips You may not stop on any footpath or nature strip, or even a driveway crossing a footpath or nature strip FOR ANY REASON. Why is it there? You could easily run over a child or force pedestrians onto the road to get around you. Penalty \$169 + 2 demerit points (School Zone).

Double parking

You may not stop on the road adjacent to another vehicle at any time even to drop off or pick up passengers. Why is it there? Double parking forces other cars to go around you causing traffic congestion and reduces the view of drivers and children crossing the road. Penalty \$304 + 2 demerit points (School Zone).

Additional safety tips for school zones: Always dropoff or pick-up your child from the designated area, following the school's procedures:

- Make sure children use the footpath-side door when getting in and out of a car:
- Make sure the hand brake is applied when the vehicle is stationary;
- Never double park;
- Never park across a pedestrian crossing;
- Never undertake a U-turn in close proximity to the school.



A group of Casino artists will travel to Kyogle to exhibit their work at the Roxy Gallery in a show titled I've Been Framed. Gallery director Ruth Titimbinis said the exhibition was reflective of the inclusive and supportive nature of the art community on the Northern Rivers.

"The Roxy Gallery has happily supported artists from throughout the Northern Rivers region and the artists of this region have reciprocated in their support for the gallery," Ruth said.

"A number of the gallery volunteers come to Kyogle on a monthly basis from areas such as Casino and Lismore and through their interest in the arts the Roxy Gallery's reputation as a great exhibition space has grown."

Roseberry Creek Improve Habitat

Roseberry Creek landholders are set to improve threatened species habitat by targeting some prickly environmental weeds in a new \$116,500 project. The project has been funded by Local Land Services and delivered in partnership with Northern Landcare Support Services (NLSS) and the landholders.

The project will involve removing weeds like lantana and cats claw, as well as undertaking fencing and tree planting to improve the condition of habitat and enhance

the value of corridor connections between World Heritage listed Gondwana Rainforest and the riparian corridor. The Roseberry Creek sub-catchment contains threatened species such as Giant Barred Frogs, Koalas, Brush-tailed Phascogales, Barking Owls, Powerful Owls and Wompoo Pigeons. It was also the place of the last sightings of the

"It is a great to see that the planning efforts by NLSS and Roseberry Creek



landholders have paid off," local resident and Roseberry Creek Landcare member Ann Hartigan said. "It is an opportunity to contribute to improving habitat for threatened species, address local creek bank erosion, grazing pressures on aquatic ecosystems and remove some of the myriad of environmental of weeds including Weeds of National Significance such as Lantana and Madeira Vine. "It is also great to see this money being spent in our local shops and using local services."
