Illegal sewer connections **TARGETTED**

Council is about to begin a thorough investigation of storm water infiltration into the Kyogle sewerage system, and this will include checking to see if private properties are contributing to the problem.

If Council finds any issues with private plumbing that allows storm water into the sewerage system, staff will be notifying property owners of what they need to do to rectify the situation.

Council's Urban Services Manager Shane Noon said the inflow of storm water was the primary cause of overflows from the sewerage system during, and immediately after, heavy rain.

"As well as this, the excessive loads increase the maintenance and operational costs of running a sewerage system," he said

"Due to the nature of local government, that means ratepayers wear the costs."

Kyogle Council has for some time been looking at ways to improve the sewerage system and has been monitoring the effects on the system of large rainfall events.

Council has found that significant amounts of rainwater/storm water is entering the sewerage system which is causing overflows and flooding houses in low lying areas connected to the system.

The major cause of the rainwater infiltration is via illegally connected storm water drains and roof down pipes on houses.

Clause 42 of the *Local Government* (Water, Sewerage and Drainage) Regulation 1993 makes it an offence to discharge soil, mud, gravel, roof water, rain water, surface water, flood water, subsoil water etc. to the sewerage system.

"Council is currently carrying out closed circuit TV investigations and relining works to reduce rainwater infiltration caused by damaged pipes," Mr Noon said.

"We are planning significant works over the next three years to further reduce the level of infiltration to an acceptable level.

"As part of these works, Council will be commencing smoke testing through the sewerage system to find storm water connections and eliminate them."

Council does not want to go down the road of issuing notices and or fines and would much rather property owners correct any problems before it gets to that stage.

"If you are in doubt about your house connections, please have them investigated now by a local plumber," Mr Noon said.

"Council is hoping that with the cooperation of property owners, it can prevent overflows and save ratepayer funds as well."

Work begins on repairs to major road slips

One of Council's grading crews is currently working on Homestead Road and next will be grading Baileys Bridge Road before moving on to the Sextonville area in June.

Another grading crew has finished work on Hillyards and Webbs Roads and will now continue on to other roads in the Boorabee Creek area.

Other maintenance works planned for June include pothole patching on Kyogle Road, Fawcetts Plain Road and sealed roads in the Afterlee and Urbenville areas, and roadside slashing along Bruxner Highway, Kyogle Road and Bentley Road.

In mid-May, contractors began work to repair major slips on Kyogle Road and Cawongla Road caused by heavy rain and flooding.

The work includes installation of rock-filled gabion baskets for stabilisation and is expected to be completed in July.

One of the first stages of the Cawongla Road slip repair will be returning the road to a standard suitable for school bus services.

Recently completed construction projects include rehabilitation of sections of Wiangaree Back Road and Omagh Road.

The initial sealing of a section of Lillian Rock Road funded by the Federal Government's Blackspot Program is nearing completion.

The upgrade of Afterlee Road and Dam Access Road is almost complete and expected to be finished in early June.

In June, Council will start rehabilitation of a section of the Bruxner Highway at Theresa Creek on behalf of Roads and Maritime Services. Council also will carry out heavy patching on streets in Bonalbo and on Clarence Way south of Bonalbo and rehabilitation of a section of Tabulam Road under the Blackspot Program.

Contractors are currently upgrading part of Tabulam Road on behalf of developers (Mountain Blue Blueberry Farm). The work has been timed to coincide with Council's closure of Tabulam Road while Daleys Bridge is replaced.

The replacement bridge is expected to be complete by the end of July.

While the road is closed, a second section of Tabulam Road near the bridge will be upgraded and a Blackspot project on the northern end of the road will be completed.

The Gradys Creek and Lions Road Bridge Renewal Program is running behind schedule and has had a further six week delay due to flooding and Council's flood recovery activities.

Stage One of the program - the replacement of Murrays Bridge and Boyles No.2 Bridge - is now expected to be completed in June.

Stage Two works are expected to start in July but a further update will be provided to residents when details are confirmed.

During June, Council staff will be repairing damaged garden beds in the Kyogle main street and continuing renovation of the residence at the Kyogle caravan park.

Work on the project began in March with cleaning the interior of the reservoir. Other works have included lining the internal and external walls with a special leakproof membrane, installing new internal and external access ladders and replacing the old roof with a new pitched roof.



Rural fire fighters HONOURED

Twelve rural fire service volunteers from the Kyogle Council area were presented with Long Service Medals at the 2017 NSW Rural Fire Service Northern Rivers Zone Medal Presentation last month.

The 12 volunteers have notched up a combined 258 years of volunteer service.

The two longest serving volunteers, Robin Keys and Ian Rodgers, of the Green Pigeon Brigade, have served the rural fire fighting service for 32 and 30 years respectively.

Mr Keys joined the then NSW Rural Fire Brigade in the 1985-86 fire season.

He was a driving force in the establishment of the Green Pigeon Brigade and became a hardworking foundation member.

He helped build the Green Pigeon Fire Station and was actively involved in numerous fundraising activities for the brigade.

Mr Keys has served continuously in the roles of Deputy Captain, Senior Deputy Captain and Captain and currently holds the position of Deputy Captain.

Mr Rodgers joined the then Bush Fire Service as an ordinary member in 1986.

He is however, no ordinary member.

Mr Rodgers has been involved at all levels of the district from fire fighter, treasurer, secretary, president, permit officer and captain at Green Pigeon Brigade, to Group Officer at District and Zone level.

LIBRARY goes high tech

A self-serve kiosk aimed at making life easier for library users has been installed at the Kyogle library.

According to Kyogle librarian Corinne Hughes the kiosk, *picture right*, is easy, fast and fun to use. It allows library users to scan their membership card and then scan their loan items before it issues a receipt of the loan transaction.

Meanwhile, the library also has gone 'live' with RFID (Radio Frequency Identification).

Funded by a Public Library Infrastructure Grant, RFID has also been installed at Casino,

Evans Head, and Coraki libraries and the mobile

library.

Each library has 'circulation assistant' hardware which automatically synchronizes with the library management system and has dramatically speeded up the circulation process.

Kyogle, Casino, and Evans Head libraries also have new security gates to ensure that items not checked out will activate an alarm. The gates are strong, attractive and perform a highly effective security function. They also feature a 'people counter which provides information on how many people are using the library. For the next few weeks the alarm may beep while customers walk through the security gates to return their items.

This will happen if your items were borrowed prior to the library going live with RFID.


NOXIOUS WEED BOOKLET

available for download

Rous County Council has produced a noxious weed identification booklet that also includes information on control techniques.

Before a weed is declared to be noxious it must meet certain criteria and the community must be consulted about the proposed declaration. It must meet the following criteria:

- Need the weed has, or could have, serious adverse effects on agriculture.
- Benefit a significant benefit to agriculture, the environment, or the community can be expected from the declaration.
- Means there are reasonable and enforceable means available to control the weed as categorised.
- Intent there is a firm intention by the local control authority, or the government, to implement a planned program to control the weed as categorised.
- Weed distribution the weed does not occur in NSW, or is of limited distribution, and has the potential to become more widespread.
- Outcome for a species to remain categorised, the local control authority must maintain an effective control program. The booklet is available free for download at www.rous.nsw.gov.au/file.asp?g=RES-AVH-18-03-64
