\$540,000 facelift for Kyogle Memorial Institute

Kyogle Council has received a \$267,000 Federal Government grant to revitalise the Kyogle Memorial Institute (KMI) Hall.

Member for Page Kevin Hogan made the long awaited funding announcement earlier this month.

Council also will chip in more than \$270,000 toward the project which will see the Roxy Art Gallery relocated to the first floor of the hall, the installation of a lift, and a new lighting and sound booth in the main auditorium.

The front entrance of the hall also will be reinstated and new displays created to showcase the historic features of the hall and its uses over time.

Council's General Manager Graham Kennett said the project would bring "stage" and "gallery" together to create an enhanced arts and cultural facility for the Kyogle local government area.

"As well as attracting more tourists to the town, the revitalised KMI will give the community a more multi-functional and integrated space to celebrate the area and the region's culture," he said.

The Federal Government's \$267,000 contribution has been provided under the first round of the new Building Better Regions Fund - Infrastructure Projects Stream.

Mr Hogan described the grant as "wonderful news" for the community and said it would give the hall a new lease of life. Tenders for the project are expected to be called in November.

Council supports bag project

Council has thrown its support behind a project to make and distribute fabric reusable shopping bags in a bid to reduce the use of plastic bags in the Kyogle Local Government Area.

The Boomerang Bag project is an initiative of the Evening branch of the Kyogle CWA whose members wanted to do something practical to promote environmental awareness and make an impact locally.

After researching the issue of plastic pollution, the group decided to join the Boomerang Bag movement -- a nation-wide grassroots, community-driven initiative that is tackling plastic pollution at its

source.

Kyogle CWA Evening Branch member Julia Curtis who is coordinating the Boomerang Bag project is hopeful that people from the wider community will join with the CWA Evening Branch members in making, distributing and using the fabric shopping bags.

Already, the group has made more than 50 bags from donated and up-cycled fabric.

The bags have been given away or left at local shops, including the Kyogle LGA, as re-usable alternatives to single use plastic bags.

Council, students join forces for mass tree planting

More than 200 trees have been planted along the banks of the Richmond River near Kyogle's off stream water storage in a joint project involving Kyogle Council, St Brigid's Primary School and Conservation Volunteers Australia.

Council prepared the site for the mass planting by mulching the river bank and digging the holes for the trees.

Tara Price from Conservation Volunteers Australia organised the trees and worked with the school to plant the trees as part of National Tree Day celebrations. The students planted forest red gums, teaks, silky oaks, callistemon and syzgiums which were donated by Southern Cross University's Koala Nursery. The trees will rehabilitate the area and provide habitat for sugar gliders that are known to populate the area.





Bridge works progressing well

The Gradys Creek and Lions Road Bridge Renewal Program is progressing steadily.

Piling is completed on Hears Bridge and continuing on Boyles (No.1) Bridge.

Construction of pile caps and abutments on Hears Bridge is well advanced.

Council's usual arrangements with local emergency services were made at the beginning of the work to ensure all services are aware of the bridge works and have access through the construction side track if required.

Replacement of Collins Creek Bridge on Collins Creek Road is in progress.

The original timber structure was damaged in the recent flood event and a new steel truss bridge will be built using natural disaster relief funding.

Council has advertised for tenders for the replacement of two bridges destroyed in the March natural disaster event.

The contract is for design and construction of a new bridge on Sawpit Creek Road

and another on McClelland Road.

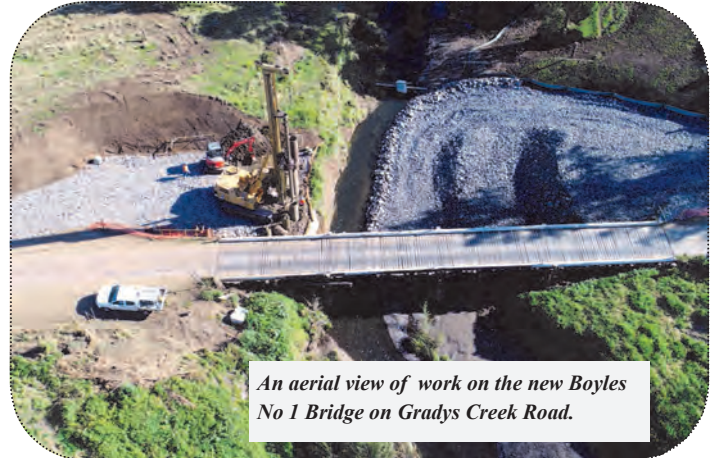
Tenders close on 1 September 2017 and a report will be presented to the September ordinary Council meeting.

Projects currently being undertaken by Council's road construction crews are rehabilitation works in Bonalbo Street, Woodenbong, heavy patching on Clarence Way and Bentley Road and initial sealing works for the extension of the bitumen section of Lillian Rock Road from Rainbow Ridge School to Kyogle Road.

One of the east of the range grading crews is currently undertaking maintenance grading of Gorge Creek Road, and will then work through the gravel roads between Grevillia and Wangaree.

The other east of the range grading crew is working on roads in the Dyraba area. Potholes on Summerland Way are being repaired with Council's paveliner.

Repair of footpaths in Sandilands Street and construction of a footpath near the working dog statue at Bonalbo have been recently completed and replacement of a culvert on Strains Road will be under-

taken in September.

Council's West of the Range crew recently completed grading Hootons Road and are now undertaking grading works in the Capeen Creek and Duck Creek Road areas while slashing is being done on Bingee-beebra and Haystack Roads.

Pavement repair patching is being done on Theresa Creek Road.

With completion of the initial stage of earthworks in the Edward Lane extension, Council staff are now carrying out installation of water mains as the next step in the Geneva Street /Edward Lane extension and rehabilitation project.

Do you have a Vision of Village Life ?

Kyogle Council is calling for expressions of interest from people who would like to join its village-based advisory groups.

The advisory groups will provide community input to Council on its Visions of Village Life project which will develop master plans for the villages of Woodenbong, Old Bonalbo, Bonalbo, Tabulam, Mallanganee and Wangaree.

Each of the six master plans will provide a blue print for the future development of the villages and will include projects relating to Council functions including stormwater, flood-

ing, Crown reserves, footpaths and cycleways, parks and gardens, community buildings, town streets, water and sewerage, cemeteries, waste, pools and recreational facilities.

Each plan also will consider community and place making provisions that contribute to the sense of place that are a vital component of village life.

New green waste drop-off bay constructed at landfill

Council has created a new green waste drop-off bay at the Kyogle landfill.

The new bay was primarily constructed to provide safe and convenient green waste drop-off for customers.

Council has to weigh all waste dropped off at the site and pay a levy on it. When the new bay is full, green waste is loaded into a skip bin, weighed and taken to the stockpile site.

After the green waste is processed and tested it is able to be removed off-site for reuse, and the waste levy paid is reimbursed.

EPA funding assisted with construction of the new bay. For further information please contact Council's Planning and Environment Department or speak to staff on-site.



COUNCIL grants on offer

Applications for grants under Kyogle Council's Community Assistance Fund have now opened.

The Community Assistance Fund provides one-off donations of up to \$1,000 for or-

ganisations, \$500 for individuals and \$5,000 for projects with matched funding.

Funding preference is given to those individuals/organisations that can demonstrate the greatest need or benefit to the wider community in the following areas: welfare; community involvement/ social interaction; sport and

recreation; the Arts; youth affairs; senior citizen affairs; cultural assistance.

Community Assistance grants are paid on a reimbursement basis in that successful applicants must provide Council with receipts and/or invoices before any funds are paid.

Applications will close at

4pm on Friday September 29. The Council will determine the successful grant applications at its November meeting.

Community invited to opening of Daleys Bridge

The new Daleys Bridge on Tabulam Road will be officially opened on Tuesday 12 September 2017 at 10am and the community is invited to attend.

The old one-lane timber bridge has been replaced with dual lane steel truss bridge.

The \$450,000 project fully funded by Council took 11 weeks to complete.

Tabulam Road was closed to through traffic while the bridge was being built.

Council used the road closure to upgrade two sections of Tabulam Road -- 400m of road north of the bridge and 800m of road south of the bridge.

The road works were funded through the Blackspot Program and developer contributions.

Mayor of Kyogle Council Cr Danielle Mulholland will officially open the new bridge.

Council works to expand housing, accommodation OPTIONS FOR AREA'S AGED

Kyogle Council is working to expand housing and accommodation options available for the area's aged and ageing population.

Council has already amended its Local Environmental Plan (LEP) so that homes suitable for older people who want to downsize can be built on smaller than normal blocks of land close to the CBD around Groom Street in Kyogle.

It is also considering doing something similar in Woodenbong.

Over the next 12 months, Council

also plans to:

- establish a working group of local community members, service providers and agency representatives to investigate diverse housing options for the aged in consultation with Council
- map land in the local government area suitable for aged care facilities
- prepare material to raise awareness, promote /or encourage individuals and the private sector around existing aged care accommodation and housing options.

Drop-off point set up for FARM WASTE

Helping farmers recycle agricultural packaging in a sustainable and environmentally friendly way is a priority for Kyogle Council and now, thanks to a new initiative, local farmers can do just that.

Council has been working with NEWaste and the Farm Waste Recovery Project to set up a free drop-off point for bulk fertiliser bags and packaging at the Kyogle Norco store.

Kyogle Council's Manager of Environmental Health David Bell said the broader Farm Waste Recovery project had been extremely successful, with more than one million tonnes of plastic being recycled into new products such as seating and recycled pipe.



"It's really great that this solution is now available to our local farmers," he said.

Council is currently speaking with the contractor who picks up the bags for recycling with the aim of establishing further drop off points in the LGA.



Waste levy should be axed

Kyogle Council has called on the NSW Government to axe the waste levy.

The Council unanimously resolved at its August meeting to write to the NSW Premier and the Minister for the Environment requesting that the government immediately lift the waste levy.

Kyogle Council has steadfastly opposed the levy since its introduction in 2008.

The levy, which taxes local government \$79.60 for every tonne of waste that goes to landfill, has been blamed for a massive increase in illegal

dumping, corrupt activity, and the cross-border black market trade in rubbish exposed in the recent Four Corners report.

“Council is calling on the Premier to remove the levy and the accompanying legislation as soon as possible,” Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Mulholland said.

“This will almost halve the cost of sending waste to landfill, reduce rates and landfill fees, and eliminate the financial incentive that has led to the current black market trade.”

The waste levy was \$10 a tonne when introduced by the State Government and has increased every year since.

“As the levy got higher in

NSW, unscrupulous operators realised it was cheaper to truck the waste to Queensland or establish illegal landfilling operations. The NSW Government has incentivised these activities through its waste levy,” Cr Mulholland said.

Kyogle Council, which does not transport any waste across the border, paid \$224,802 in waste levies last financial year.

“We (Kyogle Council) operate our own licensed landfill in Kyogle and we are currently in the process of closing our Woodenbong landfill,” Cr Mulholland said.

“All our waste that goes to landfill, is disposed of in our own landfills and all our recyclables diverted from landfill

are processed through registered recycling companies.

“Each year we recycle around 2,000 tonnes of material. If that material went to landfill instead of being recycling, we would have to pay another \$160,000 in additional waste levy fees each year.

“From the day it was brought into play, the EPAs waste levy has been criticised as a tax on local communities rather than a solution to the management of waste and its impact on the environment.

“The recent Four Corners report provided shocking evidence to validate these claims and Council is calling on the Premier to take action immediately.”

2018 finish date for Bonalbo MPS

Member for Lismore, Thomas George has laid a ceremonial brick in the new Bonalbo Multi-Purpose Service (MPS) as part of a topping out ceremony to mark the completion of the new facility's roof.

Work is progressing to schedule on Stage 1, comprising 15 residential aged care beds, a 24-hour emergency department, inpatient beds and consultations rooms, due for completion by the end of the

year.

Stage 2, comprising ‘back of house’ staff facilities, kitchen, and staff accommodation is due for completion in mid-2018.

The new MPS in Bonalbo will replace the existing hospital and outdated community health building with a modern, integrated health facility that will service the needs of the region long into the future.

The MPS model tailors healthcare needs for the local community by integrating health, aged care and emergency services, to provide flexible health service delivery.

Pools re-open on 22 September

Kyogle Council's three public swimming pools will re-open for the 2017-2018 season on Friday 22 September.

Opening days and hours for the Kyogle, Bonalbo and Woodenbong pools will remain the same as last year.

Kyogle pool will open Monday to Thursday from 6.30am to 6pm, Friday from 6.30am to 6pm (6-7.30pm exclusive use by Kyogle Swim Club), and weekends and public holidays from 10am to 6pm.

The Bonalbo pool's opening hours will be Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday and public holidays from 2pm to 6pm. It will be closed on Tuesdays.

The Woodenbong pool will open

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday and public holidays from 2pm to 6pm. It will be closed on Thursdays.

The three pools are available for private hire outside normal operating hours. The cost to privately hire Kyogle pool is \$187 an hour (plus entry fee) for a minimum two hours. Bonalbo and Woodenbong pools can be hired privately for \$121 an hour (plus entry fee) for a minimum two hours.

People can also hire Council's inflatable play centre either during normal pool hours or private hire sessions. The cost to hire the inflatable play centre at all three pools is \$330 for two hours of use and \$88 an hour for every hour after that.

Admission costs to the three pools for the 2017/2018 season are \$4 for adults, and \$3 for children, students and pensioners.
