Council suspends most developer fees

Kyogle Council is not just open for business it is actively encouraging development in a bid to grow the local economy.

At its 12 March meeting, Council voted unanimously to waive charges and contributions on all development across the local government area except for heavy haulage projects and most subdivisions.

Council hopes by waiving the charges and contributions it will encourage developers to bring forward key projects that will boost the local economy and grow jobs.

The policy, which will be reviewed after two years, is in line with Council's Community Strategic Plan which seeks to grow the area's 'cultural diversity and its economy through investment in services, infrastructure and sustainable businesses'.

Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Danielle Mulholland said Council's decision to suspend developer fees showed that it was ready to do business and prepared to go the extra mile to partner with investors to grow job opportunities and enhance the liveability of the local government area.

"I see this as a window of opportunity for entrepreneurs looking to expand their



existing business or develop a new one without the added burden of developer fees and charges," she said.

"Like all windows, this one won't remain open forever so you'll need to get in reasonably quickly."

The new Developer Contributions and Charges Discounting Policy will apply to all development applications issued by Council and completed before the review of the policy in March 2020.

And while most subdivision applications

will still attract developer contributions, the policy waives charges for small lot subdivisions (to create lots of less than 500m² in area) in the Groom Street medium density precinct.

Anyone with a previously approved but unimplemented development application can apply to Council to amend the application so that eligible contributions can be waived. However, the waiver is dependent on the development being completed while the policy is in effect.





February flew by with nary a whimper!
Council has had another very successful funding round, through the Stronger Country Communities grants, receiving almost \$1m in total for communi-

ty projects.

Now that the Visions for the Villages process has identified projects for these smaller communities, Council will be applying for funding for them in the upcoming rounds.

The Clarence Way is another big ticket item on the agenda which we have identified as a priority. We also are

exploring options around opening up Peacock Creek/Iron Pot Creek Rd between Bonalbo and Kyogle to enhance connectivity of the villages with a larger town.

NOROC has identified 10 regional priorities which are compatible with the NSW Government's priorities and Council's community strategic plan. This will enhance our lobbying capacity as we focus on projects which will have a regional impact.

The Old Bonalbo CWA held their Teal Afternoon Tea this month. The event raises much needed funds for ovarian cancer and I would like to congratulate everyone involved in the organisation of it - it is an information sharing day as well as a fundraiser, highlighting serious women's health issues.

Council is partnering with the Depart-

ment of Primary Industries to deliver a free workshop through the Rural Resilience Program on 27 March in Bonalbo Hall.

The workshop shows you how to showcase your stock or produce through the development of an online video.

Renewal energy grants **AVAILABLE**

Local community groups have the chance to apply for grants under the Federal Government's Solar Communities Program to undertake small scale renewable energy generation and storage projects.

Grants of between \$2500 and \$12,500 are available under the program which is only being offered to community groups in 36 electorates, including Page and Richmond, throughout the country.

Projects could include purchase and installation of solar photovoltaic systems, battery storage for solar photovoltaic systems and solar hot water systems.

To be eligible community groups must:

• be located in an eligible region

- have at least \$2,500 of eligible expenditure
- hold an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- provide a letter of consent from the building owner/manager, if you are not the building owner/manager
- ensure you use an installer that is accredited and licensed to perform the relevant electrical/plumbing work (for solar photovoltaic generation and battery storage systems installers must also be accredited with the Clean Energy Council)
- provide the relevant mandatory attachments.

The Kyogle, Woodenbong and Bonalbo pools will close down for the off season on Monday 30 April.

Community advised of **RALLY PLANS**

Organisers of the Border Ranges Rally proposed for 13, 14 and 15 July this year have begun consulting with Kyogle district residents and property owners affected by proposed road closures.

Members of the Gold Coast Tweed Motorsporting Club (GCTMC) are doorknocking residents who live along the route of the proposed rally as well as affected side roads.

Lack of advance notification was identified by the community as an issue following the 2016 rally.

Council resolved after that rally that the GCTMC would have to submit a proposal for any future events to allow for consultation with affected property owners and residents before deciding whether or not to approve it.

In line with its push for greater community consultation, Council also plans to conduct a mail out to property owners and residents living along the proposed route.

The 2018 event plan submitted to Council identifies nine possible rally stages --Happy Valley, Hillyards, Baraimal (unlikely to be used), Pines, Dyraaba, Knights, Old Cob-O-Corn, and Toonumbar -- which are likely to be affected by road closures.

Under the proposal, rally headquarters would be based at the Kyogle Showground, with the first day (Friday 13 July) of the event set aside for reconnaissance runs which would be conducted at normal road speeds. The only road earmarked for closure on day one is Ferndale Road which will be used for media and promotional drives.

Competitive stages of the rally would be held around Kyogle on the Saturday and Sunday, with an evening stage at the showground on Saturday night.

Council will decide the fate of the proposed rally following the completion of the community consultation.

The 2016 rally generated considerable community attention with Council receiving deputations, petitions and submissions from groups and individuals both firmly opposed to and in support of the rally

In response to the community interest, Council conducted a survey of landowners and residents along the rally route to gauge their views.

The majority of people who took part in the survey (78 %) were in favour of the rally, 79% were keen to see Council support future events and 77% believed the overall effect of the event to be positive.

Of the 10 people who said they did not think Council should support any future rallies, many listed the impact of the rally on the environment and council infrastructure as well as dust, noise and inconvenience it caused residents as reasons for opposing it.

The GCTMC is also planning on holding rallies at Urbenville (the Urbenville Sprint on 19 May) and Woodenbong (Yowie Country Rally on 13 October) this year.

An application is already before the Tenterfield Shire Council for the Urbenville Sprint Rally, which will not affect any roads in the Kyogle Council area. An application to conduct the Yowie Country Rally will be presented to Kyogle Council later this year.

Flood recovery nears completion

One year after the March 2017 flood and three of the four bridges washed away in the Kyogle Council local government area have been rebuilt.

Council also has repaired all but one of the 12 major landslips caused by the deluge in the wake of ex-tropical cyclone Debbie and repaired numerous culverts and washouts.

While the Council has worked tirelessly to fix the worst of the flood damage and restore access to residents, it's likely to be another 12 months before all of the work is completed.

The final repair bill is expected to top \$9 million and has been funded through the National Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements.

Of the four bridges destroyed in the flood, bridges on Collins

Creek, McClellands and Sawpit repairs involves restoring Creek roads have been rebuilt and are open to traffic. Construction of the final bridge on Robothams Road has begun and is expected to be completed by the end of June.

A lot of the outstanding flood

drainage issues and gravel washed away on unsealed roads. This work will be undertaken in tandem with Council's regular maintenance cycle over the next 12 months.

Council's General Manager

Graham Kennett praised staff for their hard work over the past 12 months.

He said they had worked long and hard to fix the flood damage as well as complete Council's ambitious capital works program.

Almost \$1M for

seven community projects

Projects in Kyogle and Woodenbong will benefit from almost \$1 million in funding under round one of the State Government's Strong Country Communities (SCC) Fund.

The funding was announced last week by Member for Lismore Thomas George.

The Kyogle Council projects to be funded were:

- Greening Kyogle Main Street \$100,000
- Kyogle Aquatic Centre redevelopment \$154,336
- Kyogle Memorial Institute Hall revitalization \$220,000
- Kyogle Recreation Reserve improvements \$100,000
 - Kyogle Amphitheatre stage \$100,000
 - Kyogle All Active expansion \$100,000
- Woodenbong Recreation Reserve improvements \$100,000

"Stronger Country Communities funding is an investment in local infrastructure to improve the lives of residents and enhance the attractiveness of our region – this funding will help us do exactly that," Mr George said.

Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Danielle Mulholland described the funding announcement as 'great news for Kyogle and Woodenbong'.

"These projects have been planned for quite some time and now the funding and the planning have come together and we have a fabulous result for the community,"

she said.

"These projects were developed through the community strategic planning process and Council advocated and applied for funding on this mandate.

"It's great to see the community engagement and planning processes coming to fruition with such tangible results through our partnerships with the State Government.

"We have recently undertaken further engagement in the villages through the Visions of the Villages process and I expect that future Stronger Country Community funding rounds will reflect the village priorities that have been identified."

Kyogle Council has been allocated \$1.4 million in round two of the Stronger Country Communities Fund.

The Stronger Country Communities fund is one of the six funds that make up the NSW Government's \$1.3 billion Regional Growth Fund.

It targets smaller-sized projects that have the capacity to make a big difference to the lives of country people.



Council targets pothole repairs on Clarence Way

Patching of potholes on the length of Clarence Way is a priority for Council this month.

Heavy patching of Iron Pot Creek Road and Afterlee Road also will be carried out, while work will start on the initial seal of a section of Afterlee Road between Dam Access Road and Afterlee Public School.

Council also plans to upgrade the Summerland Way at The Glen during April.

The road will remain open under traffic control while the work is carried out, but short delays can be expected during work hours.

This job is separate to the project managed by Roads and Maritime Service 4km north of Grevillia between Imbreys Road and Montgomerys Road.

Other major works planned for the coming month include:

- Repair of a landslip on Theresa Creek Road. This work will be carried out by a contractor and will be funded through the joint State/Federal *Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements*.
- Installation of a culvert on Bennetts Road in conjunction with other flood damage repair works.

Eden Creek Road and the southern section of Clarence Way will be graded during April, while slashing will be carried out on Bruxner Highway, Fawcetts Plain Road and around Green Pigeon.

Vegetation spraying is planned for Summerland Way and Kyogle Road.

There is good news for motorists, with construction of McIntosh Bridge on Lions Road nearing completion.

French Bridge and Ottery Bridge on Williams Road are expected to open to traffic in April and a temporary bridge will be constructed on Leeses Road.

Free drop off at community recycling centre

If you've got old paint, out of date gas bottles or blown light bulbs piling up in the back of the garage, it's time to take action and visit your local Community Recycling Centre located at the Kyogle Waste Facility.

Household quantities of these items as



well as batteries, oils and smoke detectors can be dropped off free of charge all year around.

Not only is it free for all NSW residents to drop off at their CRC, but it also means that most of these items will be recycled ensuring that these precious resources don't end up as landfill.

More than 237 tonnes of unwanted paint and 102 tonnes of old gas bottles have already been recycled through the North Coast's Community Recycling Centres.

The paint ends up as an alternative fuel for use in cement kilns and undamaged gas bottles are retested, restamped and returned into the hire industry. Damaged bottles and paint tins are recycled as scrap metal.

Rous County Council tackles weed control

Weed biosecurity in the Kyogle Council area is undertaken by Rous County Council (RCC).

RCC is constituted under the *Local Government Act 1993*, and was specifically formed to provide weed biosecurity as well as bulk water supply and flood mitigation services to councils on the Northern Rivers.

Kyogle Council has elected only to use its weed biosecurity services.


RCC uses the weeds listed in the *Biosecurity Act 2015* and the Regional Strategic Weed Management Plan to guide its activities and those of the community.

The regional plan sorts weeds into categories in order of priority based on their level of threat, current distribution and feasibility to control.

As the local control authority, RCC:

- Conducts property inspections for compliance with the Act.
- Identifies, inspects and treats high risk sites and pathways, and develops weed

- management plans for the region including rapid response plans for new incursions
- Controls high priority weeds on roadsides, and rapid response control to new weed incursions.
- Creates and distributes weed education material including flyers and media releases, "best practice" advice, and information on weed control.
- Provides plant identification assistance.
- Delivers training and information to landholder and community groups and schools, at workshops and field days.
- Provide access to biological control agents through the Department of Primary Industries RCC does not:
- Spray common roadside weeds or control common weeds on Public land.
- Control weeds on private property as contractors, or for free. RCC also cannot advertise or recommend private contractors for weed spraying.
- Become involved in discussions between neighbouring landholders regarding common weeds.



If you are a landholder, it is your responsibility to look around your property regularly for any new weed incursions.

You should know your weeds and where they are categorised under the Biosecurity Act.

It's also your responsibility to manage your own property to eradicate the weed or minimise (depending on the weed) the risk of weeds spreading.
