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CULMARAN CREEKRoad Project officially opened

Kyogle Council's \$5 million Culmaran Creek Road Upgrade Project was officially opened on 10 July by Mayor Danielle Mulholland and Federal Member for Page Kevin Hogan.

The upgraded road will improve transport links, increase freight efficiencies and pave the way for more local jobs.

Kyogle Mayor Danielle Mulholland said the project was a great example of what could be achieved when the three tiers of government and the community worked together.

"It is largely due to partnerships that this road got funded – partnerships between different levels of government, with industry leaders and the community, and I thank them all for their assistance," Cr Mulholland said.

The Federal Government committed more than \$2 million to the project under the Regional Jobs and Investment Packages and the State Government provided \$2.6 million through the Fixing Country Roads Program.



Kyogle Council committed a further \$245,000, Mara Global Foods \$30,000 and Mara Seeds \$10,000.

Member for Page Kevin Hogan said the completion of the road was great news for the community.

"Local companies like Mara Seeds and Mara Global Foods came to me because they were having difficulty getting their produce to markets, which was restricting their growth and job creation," he said.

"The new road will support the existing

25 jobs at the two companies and provide the potential for doubling the workforce over the next 12 to 18 months.

"It supported another 17 jobs during the construction phase.

"By creating a new dual lane concrete bridge capable of supporting heavier vehicles and their cargo, we have unlocked the barriers to growth that many local industries have faced due to poor freight access to places like the Port of Brisbane."

from the Mayor ...

I attended the National General Assembly of Local Government in Canberra in June. While in Canberra, I took the opportunity to meet with Ministers to discuss priority issues such as funding for the Clarence Way, drought assistance, and reducing red tape for farmers trying to access drought funding.

Cr Kylie Thomas and I also attended a drought forum where barriers to drought support were discussed along with options around ensuring water security for all of our ratepayers. Various Councils put forth their ideas and solutions to what is becoming a critical issue for many communities.

Council recently resolved to investigate options around developing a koala plan of management.

Most of our neighbouring councils have koala plans of management. Our Council is looking at a number of strategies to address issues affecting koalas and their habitat. Koalas are already on the vulnerable species list and early intervention can prevent them from becoming endangered or critically endangered, like 117 other species in NSW.

In a proactive move, Council will look at the issues around a koala plan of management, and policies for koala and koala habitat protection.

Council also will explore partnerships with a broad range of stakeholders including State and Federal Governments, and look at protection measures already in place.

We will, of course, engage community members in the development and implementation of these policies and strateaies.

Council is also calling on the State Government to increase its investment to mitigate the negative effects of the degradation of our native forests and crown lands caused by invasive weeds and bell miner associated die back, particularly in relation to koala habitat.

Some people are concerned that a koala plan of management will impact their farming activities, however the vast majority of such activities are covered under other legislation such as the NSW Vegetation SEPP.

Ultimately, Council will look at what can be done to protect koalas and their habitat, what is the best way to do it, and whether the cost to Council will be offset by the benefits.

All of these issues will be debated when the report comes back to the full

Council also resolved to write to NSW's Deputy Premier to urge him to put a stop to the proposed Essential Energy job cuts in our LGA and region, to ensure consistent and comparable Essential Energy services.

Council is concerned about the impact the proposed job cuts will have on the community and quality service delivery to rural areas.

I'd like to take this opportunity to recognise Pat Saville and Noelle Lynden-Way on being presented with Red Cross Service awards.

Volunteers in our communities often go unrecognised, so it was great to see two very committed volunteers be recognised for their contribution.

I get tied up a lot with meetings, so it was wonderful to go West of the Range to open the Culmaran Creek Road upgrade with our Federal Member Kevin Hogan.

This is part of Council's commitment to supporting industry growth, particularly in the Tabulam agribusiness precinct.

There is still a lot to do and we are anxiously awaiting announcements around Federal and State grant programs so we can undertake the next part of this project which includes further upgrades to the Clarence Way amongst other key areas in this precinct. YUM-BE-LEH

and come back soon

Yum-be-leh, a local Aboriginal phrase meaning "bye for now", will be featured on signs at the entrance/exit of Kyogle Council and its towns and villages.

Local Aboriginal groups from the Githabul and Gullibul people worked with Council to find the right phrase to be added to the signs, which already feature the new Kyogle place brand incorporating landmarks as interpreted by local Aboriginal artists.

"The inclusion of local Aboriginal language and artwork on the entrance/exit signage is building on the relationships being developed between Council and Aboriginal representative groups," Kyogle Council Mayor Danielle Mulholland said.


"It's really great that this is happening just as we've celebrated NAIDOC Week and in the United Nations International Year of Indigenous Languages.

"As with the use of the phrase Jingi Walla (hello and welcome) across the region, it is hoped that in time the use and knowledge of Yum-be-leh will become more common."

The new messages are expected to be added to the entry signage in the coming weeks.

Cr Mulholland said Council was aware that there were often different ways to spell words that were spoken in the various local Aboriginal languages, and variations in the way some words were pronounced.

"There are a number of local dialects spoken across the Kyogle LGA, and repre-



sentatives from the local Githabul and Gullibul people have come together and shown their support for the rear of the new entrance signs to carry the phrase "Yum-be-leh", as a representative 'bye for now' statement," she said.

Council met with representatives from local Aboriginal groups on 4 July, with the meeting covering a range of issues.

It resulted in an understanding that practical collaborations would be the focus of an ongoing partnership and improved relationships between Council and local Aboriginal groups and their representatives.

It was agreed that celebrating language was a very important part of building that relationship.

FUN HEALTH, fitness program for kids

and sign up for paperless rates notices

Want to help the environment?

Council has a number of services available to help you do your bit for the environment.

For instance, you can go green with paperless rates notices.

You can register for electronic notices through enotices by visiting https://kyogle.enotices.com.au and quoting the reference number on the bottom left hand side of your rates notice.

Alternatively, you can register with Bpay View at www.bpay.com.au, this time quoting the registration number on the bottom right hand side of your notice.

But please note, if you register for Bpay View or an electronic Notice (E-Notice), you must ensure that you keep Council updated about any changes to your postal address, email address, phone numbers etc.

A Change of Address form is located on Council's website, which can be easily completed and then sent to council.

You can also save water by upgrading your toilet from a single flush to a dual flush system or installing a rainwater tank.

Kyogle Council can offer a rebate of up to \$720 for either a tank of a toilet upgrade for eligible residential properties connected to town water or sewer within the LGA.

the way on climate change

Kyogle Council will source all its electricity needs from renewables by 2030.

On its way to meeting that 10 year target, Council will generate 25% of its electricity demands through on-site solar energy production and source another 25% from renewables by 2025.

Council currently meets an estimated 6.1% of its electricity demand through rooftop solar panels.

Council set the ambitious targets at its June meeting when Councillors unanimously adopted an action plan for energy efficiency and renewable energy which was developed through the Sustainable Councils and Communities Program.

Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Danielle Mulholland said the action plan adopted by Council would ultimately save Council money as well as help combat climate change.

"Climate change is a real concern for many of our residents," Cr Mulholland said.

"And as a Council we are committed to doing whatever we can to protect the Council area from the devastating effects climate change is predicted to bring.

"The action plan we have adopted will ultimately also result in financial savings for Council.

"Kyogle Council is leading by example and we will be encouraging and supporting the use of renewable energy by the community, particularly in new developments."



Council has already seen its electricity consumption fall over the past 11 years generating savings of around \$82,000 and 300MWh (23% of consumption) per year through actions including:

- Installation of 85kW of solar PV capacity on Council buildings
- Street lighting changeover to compact fluorescent lamps to 57% of the system
- Changeover of 250 lights in Council buildings to LED technology
- Solar hot water system installations at Councils pools
- Variable speed drives installed on water and sewerage pumping stations
 Under the action plan, Council will advance its efficiency drive in order to meet its new targets.

In the short to medium term, Council also will continue to replace fluorescent

lights with LEDs and install roof-top and ground-mounted solar PV systems at most of its facilities and sites including water treatment plants, sewerage treatment works and Council buildings, and test the market for the purchase of energy from renewable sources.

All remaining high energy use street lighting will be upgraded to LED technology when it becomes available.

In the longer term, the action plan identifies the possibility of developing two micro-hydro electricity generation systems at Kyogle's off-stream storage dam and on a weir in the Richmond River near the dam.

Council also will establish a taskforce made up of Councillors, staff and community members to drive action on climate change for the future of our community.

HILLYARDS ROAD sealing to begin in August

In August, Council will undertake the initial sealing of 1.3km of Hillyards Road between Bentley Road and Doohans Road.

This project will feature substantial drainage improvements and realignment of sections of road to improve conditions for motorists and relieve maintenance stress on the road network.

August should also see the completion of the widening and rehabilitation of Bentley Road between Hillyards Road and Back Creek Road.

Resurfacing and rehabilitation of an ur-



ban section of Kyogle Road was completed by contractors in July.

The improved stretch of road will reduce stress on the maintenance costs and cycle of our sealed road maintenance crew and will enable Council to concentrate maintenance efforts on other areas.

Further rehabilitation of Kyogle Road (near Quarry Road) is planned for later this financial year near.

Bridge and culvert works completed in July include replacement of Peacock Dip Bridge on Peacock Creek Road, Brindle Creek No.1 Bridge on Tree Fern Road, Hayes Road Bridge, and a large culvert on Clarence Way in Yabbra Forest.

Council has commenced survey and design works for upcoming rehabilitation works on Gradys Creek Road which will improve a further 1.5km of various sections of Gradys Creek Road.

Investigation has also commenced for the much-anticipated initial sealing of Council's section of Clarence Way south of the Bruxner Highway, *pictured above*.



COUNCIL ACTS to protect local koalas

Kyogle Council will investigate the best options to protect and support koala populations in its local government area.

Council resolved at its July meeting to work with community members, government agencies and advocacy groups to find the most effective policy to help protect core koala habitat.

The move comes in response to community concerns about the future of the koala in the Kyogle LGA and follows other councils in the region adopting their own koala plans of management.

Council at its 8 July meeting also resolved to lobby the State Government to increase its funding to protect koala populations, focusing in particular on the degradation of native forests and crown lands caused by invasive weeds and bell miner associated die back.

Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Danielle Mulholland described Council's multi-pronged strategy to protect koalas as a "proactive" response to a complex issue.

"Koalas are already on the vulnerable species list and early intervention could prevent the species from becoming endangered or critically endangered like 117 other species in NSW," Cr Mulholland said.

"Council is looking at a number of strategies to address issues affecting koalas and their habitat and will also explore partnerships across a broad range of stakeholders including State and Federal governments.

"We will, of course, engage community members in the development and implementation of these policies and strategies.

"We are also calling on the State Government to increase its investment to mitigate the negative effects of the degradation of our native forests and crown lands which impact on koala habitat.

"More than a third of our LGA is state forests or national parks and those agencies need to take responsibility for their part in this process."



COUNCIL GRANT applications now open

The fund provides one-off grants of up to \$1,000 for organisations, \$500 for individuals and \$5,000 for projects with matched funding.

lic School would like to sincerely thank Kyogle Council for providing this resource that benefits so many," a Parents and Citizens' Association spokesperson said.

Meanwhile, Kyogle Council will determine this year's successful grant applications at its October meeting.

WORKS BEGIN

on stream bank restoration

Important on-ground works are happening in the Upper Richmond to stabilise and restore stream banks.

The work is being carried out by North Coast Local Land Services in partnership with Conservation Volunteers Australia, Borders Ranges Richmond Valley Landcare Network, and NSW Soil Conservation.

Significant stream bank erosion has occurred as a result of the lack of riparian vegetation and repeated flood events over time.

The aim of the project is to reduce valuable soil washing away and lessen followon impacts erosion has on the river condition.

Earlier in the year, sites requiring remediation were identified and prioritised. Engineering works have now commenced to stabilise sites and reinstate stream bank stability with ongoing works planned.

Following the engineering works weed control and native revegetation is being



undertaken.

Landholders will also have the added benefit of assistance with stock exclusion fencing and off stream watering.

Emma Stone from the Landcare network said she was grateful to see this support coming to the upper Richmond where landholders had identified that simply fencing off livestock from the creek and replanting was not enough to tackle some of the erosion challenges.

Project Manager Brendan O'Brien pre-

dicted the five-year project, ending in 2023, would have a positive impact on water quality in the catchment.

"During the project we are looking to increase collaboration with local landholders and other organisations to deliver great on-ground outcomes, including improved water quality, reduced erosion and increased soil health," he said.

Funding for the project has been delivered through the Australian Government Regional Land Partnerships Program.
