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## COUNCIL TO BUY land on Fairy Mount

Council will buy 16.3 hectares of land on Fairy Mount as part of its strategy to create a network of mountain bike, walking and jogging trails close to Kyogle.

Council approved the purchase of the land, which includes the existing walking track to the top of Fairy Mount, at its September meeting.

Council began negotiating the possible purchase of the land with the current owners during the development of its Mountain Bike Trail Development Strategy.

Stage one of the strategy included supporting the development of a mountain bike facility in Boorabee State Forest and upgrading the Kyogle BMX track to a pump track.

With the pump track completed and the development of trails in Boorabee State Forest in progress, Council is now turning its attention to Stage 2 of the strategy.

It provides for walking and mountain bike trails to the summit of Fairy Mount

and the development of a viewing platform or lookout near the summit.

The trails would start and end at Mount Street lookout and the strategy also includes upgrades to this lookout.

The aim is to have walking and moun-

tain bike riding opportunities that are easily accessible to Kyogle residents as well as create attractions for visitors and tourists.

However, as the majority of the north-western side of Fairy Mount is privately-

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## MAYOR, Deputy re-elected

Cr Danielle Mulholland, *pictured right*, has been re-elected to serve another year as Mayor of Kyogle Council.

The C Ward Councillor was elected unopposed at the September Council meeting and will lead Council into the next local government election in 2021.

Originally, local government elections were to be held this year, however the State Government postponed them for 12 months due to the COVID-19



pandemic.

B Ward Councillor John Burley, *pictured above right*, also was re-elected Deputy Mayor unopposed.



This is Cr Mulholland's sixth term as Mayor and Cr Burley's fifth term as Deputy Mayor.

The Council at the September meeting also set its meeting

dates and times for the coming 12 months.

Councillors resolved to continue holding meetings on the second Monday of every month except in January when no meeting is held and June when the meeting is held on the Tuesday after the Queen's birthday long weekend.

Meetings will continue to be held at the Council Chambers at 1 Stratheden Street, Kyogle and will start at 5pm.

### *from the Mayor ...*

Well to say that this has been an eventful month is an understatement.

The closure of the border with Queensland, the establishment of the border bubble in response and the on-going issues for people as a result has absorbed an enormous amount of time and effort.

I've been working closely with our local member Janelle Saffin and the NSW Cross-Border Commissioner and other mayors to try to get some sense of where this is all going and to keep up to date with how our issues are being progressed.

We are currently meeting once or twice a week to try to solve some of the issues for people who need to transition between Queensland and NSW, however the Queensland Government is reluctant to make any hasty changes to current arrangements.

As I write this, the Queensland Government has advised that it has expanded its border bubble to include all of the Kyogle Council area as well as the Lismore, Byron, Ballina, Richmond Valley, Tenterfield and Glen Innes local government areas.

That means that from 1am on 1 October, any resident living in the Kyogle local government area (LGA) and the other listed LGAs can now apply for a border permit to travel anywhere in Queensland.

I would encourage everyone to keep monitoring official information sources to stay informed, however this is a great result and one the Northern Rivers Joint Organisation has been lobbying for since the border restrictions were first imposed.

Street libraries continue to be rolled out across the area and a big thank you to all the generous souls who have donated books so that this initiative can be implemented to the benefit of all.

Council has agreed to install some memorial seats for the late Tom Hale and Frank Burgess.

Tom's seat will be a rising sun veteran memorial seat and Frank's will be a different style and both will progress just as soon as we can get them into the works program.

I'd like to thank the Bonalbo Progress Association for partnering with us to deliver Tom's seat.

I would also like to thank all the Bonalbo and Tabulam community members who have lobbied for this recognition for Tom and Frank.

This is a great example of Council and community partnerships working well to deliver projects identified by the community, for the community.

We've also had a bit of confusion around the Tabulam Bridge opening which is a \$48M project funded by the State Government.

There will be an official opening at some point (subject to whatever Covid restrictions apply at the time) and all interested parties will have an opportunity to participate but, in the meantime, it's open to traffic and is being used on a daily basis.

The fate of the old bridge is in the hands of the State Government although it is scheduled for demolition and we're working with all the relevant authorities to ensure that the wishes of local residents, including our First Nation people, who have an historical connection to the bridge are considered. As soon as we hear something, we'll let everyone know via the usual mediums.

I'd like to remind all the ladies that the Breastscreen NSW North Coast mobile unit will be in Kyogle from 30 September to 21 October and Bonalbo from 21-27 October, so please take the opportunity to get screened. It's a simple procedure that could save your life.

It's also timely to remind everyone (as if we need any reminding after last year) that we are heading into the start of the next bushfire season. If you have any questions or concerns or you're just looking for advice about how to prepare your family and property for fire, please contact your local Rural Fire Brigade. They can give you information and advice on how best to be prepared.

## What you must do when BUILDING

Just about everyone knows you need a development application to build a new house or undertake renovations.

But did you know you also need a construction certificate before you can start work and an occupation certificate before you can move into your new house or use the renovated part of a building?

Building a new house or renovating your property is always exciting. However, the development application process can sometimes be confusing and overwhelming.

Most people know that they need to lodge a development application with Council and obtain development consent before going ahead with building a new house or renovating.

However, a development consent does not mean you can start building work. You must first do four things:

1. Get a Construction Certificate – this is an approval from Council or a private certifier to do building work
2. Appoint a Principal Certifying Authority (PCA) to monitor construction – this can be Council or an accredited certifier
3. Give Council and the PCA two days' notice before you start work
4. Complete any works listed in the 'Prior to commencing work' part of your development consent.

Many people also do not realise that there is one more very important thing you have to do once all your building work is completed and BEFORE you move in to your new home or start using your new deck, shed or other new building.



That is obtain an Occupation Certificate from Council or a private certifier.

An Occupation Certificate authorises the occupation and use of a new building or part of a building and is required under NSW planning and building law.

Council is unable to issue you with an Occupation Certificate after you have commenced using your new space and without one, any insurance policies you have taken out to protect your new asset may be void.

If you have undertaken building work without a Construction Certificate, commenced using your new building before obtaining an Occupation Certificate, or even built something without development consent (if it was required) don't stress.

There are ways you can make your development lawful such as obtaining development consent or a Building Certificate for works already completed.

Council's planning and building services team can offer advice on which path is

most suitable for your circumstances or you can seek independent advice from a planning professional or private building certifier.

Forms to appoint Council as your Principal Certifying Authority and to notify Council of when you intend to commence building work are also available from the website.

## Three public pools RE-OPEN

Kyogle Council's three public swimming pools have re-opened for the 2020-2021 season.

Council has COVID plans in place for the Kyogle, Bonalbo and Woodenbong pools which require everyone entering the pool complexes to sign in and provide a contact number.

In line with current COVID



requirements, hand sanitizer is available at the kiosk counter at each of the pools and staff are cleaning and disinfecting frequently used and touched areas several times a day.

Council also is asking people

who are unwell or maybe experiencing COVID-like symptoms to stay at home.

Contactless payment options are also being encouraged, with pool users urged to purchase ticket books or seasonal pool passes.

All three pools will open the same days and hours as last year.

Kyogle pool opens Monday to Thursday from 6.30am to 6pm, Friday from 6.30am to 7.30pm (6-7.30pm exclusive use of the

main pool by Kyogle Swim Club) and weekends and public holidays from 10am to 6pm.

The Bonalbo pools opening hours are Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday and public holidays from 2-6pm. It will be closed on Tuesdays.

Woodenbong pool is open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday and public holidays from 2-6pm. It is closed on Thursdays.



## New tractor, mulcher for WOODENBONG

A new four-wheel drive tractor and mulcher were delivered to Woodenbong recently much to the delight of the community volunteers who maintain the town's showground, common area and public spaces.

Funded under the Federal Bushfire Grants Kyogle Council received after last year's horrific bushfires, the tractor replaces an old ride-on mower which was previously used to keep Woodenbong looking spic and span.

Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Danielle Mulholland described the new tractor as a blessing for the Woodenbong community.

"I am delighted that the Woodenbong community got this tractor," she said.

"It is well deserved and a smart decision by Council to support local community organisations who do so much for their community.

"The tractor will make life much easier for the volunteers who will be able to finish jobs in half the time.

"I'd also like to thank Kevin Hogan, our Federal MP, who made representations to have Kyogle Council included in the Bushfire



Recovery Program which enabled us to fund projects like this one."

Cr Lindsay Passfield said the new tractor would strengthen Woodenbong's already robust volunteer base and enhance efficiency.

Christine Reid, of the Woodenbong Showground Trust, said the tractor and mulcher would be put to good use.

"The Woodenbong common and the showgrounds have never looked so good and we're prepared and ready to get going

on all of our events as soon as the Covid restrictions are eased," she said.

Lynn Parker, who is also a member of the Showground Trust, was over the moon that after years of chasing funding for a tractor, it had finally become a reality.

"We're ecstatic that we got this tractor which will be a big asset to the community and the various local organisations," she said.

"The time it takes to prepare the grounds for events will be more than halved."

The BreastScreen NSW North Coast mobile unit will be returning to Kyogle for a three week visit from 30 September until 21 October.

Next stop will be Bonalbo from 21 October – 27 October 2020.

Appointments for both stops are now open for booking.

## BENCHES get the green light

Benches in honour of two prominent West of the Range men will be installed at Bonalbo and Tabulam at the request of the local community.

Council agreed at its September meeting to install a memorial bench, like the one pictured right, in Patrick McNamee Park at Bonalbo in memory of the late Tom Hale, a World War II veteran and former prisoner of war.

Meanwhile, a standard bench featuring a memorial plaque will be installed outside the Tabulam SES Shed in honour of the late Frank Burgess.

The communities of Bonalbo and Tabulam approached Council to install the benches as a way to recognise the significant contribution the two men made to the towns they called home.

Mr Hale, who died in 2017 aged 95, was captured by the



Japanese in Java and was sent to work on the notorious Burma Railway. He was the last surviving POW of the Kyogle Council area.

Although he grew up in Kyogle, he settled at Bonalbo after the war and was a long-time member and office bearer of the Bonalbo RSL sub-Branch and a vocal advocate for the Bonalbo community.

Mr Burgess was well known West of the Range and was actively involved in the Tabulam community and had a long association with the SES.

Originally from America, Mr Burgess was a symbol of the Tabulam community's acceptance of newcomers and was embraced by the community into which he quickly integrated.

owned land, Council first needs to buy some of the land from the current owners if it is to develop the trails to the summit.

On the back of ongoing negotiations, the current owners have now agreed to sell a 16.3 hectare portion of their 40 hectare block of land to Council.

The acquisition of such a significant amount of land in close proximity to the town opens up further opportunities to develop Kyogle's growing reputation as a destination for nature-based tourism.

Council will consult with the community on any emerging proposals as options are further developed in the future.

In the meantime, Council has set aside funds in its 2020/2021 budget to buy the land and will seek grant funding to further develop the walking and bike trails and associated amenities as per the adopted Mountain Bike Trail strategy.

## Lynches Creek Road project TO START SOON

The reinstatement of the Boomi Creek Road culvert washed away in February's flood event was completed in September.

Work to replace the furthest bridge on Rodgers Road with a pipe also is nearing completion.

Once that project is finished, this crew will move to Eden Creek Road for another bridge to pipe replacement just past the O'Donnell Creek Road intersection.

Work has started on the first stage of the Lynches Creek Road sealing project, which has been funded by the State Government's Fixing Local Roads program.

Lynches Creek Road is closed between Collins Valley Road and Campbell Bridge for two weeks from 28 September to 9 October

while concrete pavement construction is carried out.

Drainage works have commenced on Lions Road and rehabilitation works on Kyogle Road are complete.

Work was delayed slightly on the heavy patching Council carries out on behalf of Roads and Maritime Services while a section of Ettrick Road on the eastern side of the range was rehabilitated and widened; a Safer Road funding application has been made for further works on Ettrick Road.

The month of October will see the finalisation of several projects.

The new bridge on Hootons Road, *pictured*, will be open in October, as will Dyraaba Station No. 2 Bridge on Dyraaba Road. Residents and users of Dyraaba Road have patiently endured a long road closure and Council will move out of the area for a few weeks to allow movement of machinery and



deliveries before we return to close the road for construction of Lockharts Bridge.

Sealing of the last unsealed section of Clarence Way is scheduled for 1 October.

The crew will then be focusing on ancillary works such as signage, guideposts, and line marking in order to have the project fully completed in October.

## Creating art at STUDIO 306

Studio 306 is the place where Marion Arent and Keith Cameron have set up work spaces so they can continue their creative endeavours.

*Studio 306* is also the title for the exhibition they are holding at Council's Roxy Gallery during October.

Marion and Keith are both proficient in their chosen art forms and this will be the first exhibition they have held in the gallery's new home.

In April 2013, their joint exhibition, *Fire and Stone, Paper and Steel* attracted a lot of interest and since that time, they have moved house from Tabulam to Kyogle.

Marion's art reflects a Zen approach to life. She works largely in pen and ink, transforming expression into an evolving act of visual poetry.

Keith, known for his amazing public art

metal sculptures, has had a long and involved interest in sculpting and fabricating in metal.

As a qualified metal fabricator, Keith was the artist behind the large Butter Churn sculpture in Lismore and the amazing Goanna, now installed in the garden area front of the Lismore Regional Gallery.

## TOOLKIT EXPLAINS national environmental law

Are you planning a project or development, or changing the way that you use your land, which might have impacts on our environment? If so, you may need additional approvals under national law.

To help you work out what you need to do, the Australian Government has developed an information toolkit to explain our national environmental law – the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* (The EPBC Act).

The act has been designed to protect Australia's unique animals, plants, habitats and heritage places now and into the future.

The EPBC Act makes sure 'matters of national environmental significance' are identified, and any potential negative impacts on them are considered and managed before any changes in land use or new developments are approved.

Andrew McNee from the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment says anyone unsure if their project requires approval under the EPBC Act should contact the department early.

"We're here to help. You can arrange a pre-referral meeting with one of our staff to discuss your plans. Getting that early advice could save you a lot of wasted time and money, and help our environment."

## WHITE TRUCK

### a relic of earlier days

If this truck could talk, it would have a great story to tell about the early days of Kyogle Shire Council.

According to a local truck enthusiast, this is a White truck built sometime between 1918 and 1925. He says that it was imported from the United States most probably by the Federal Government of the time.

Apparently, quite a lot of White trucks were brought into Australia after World War I by the government and passed on to local governments.

The aim was to provide councils with the means undertake more work, employ more ex-soldiers and get the economy going again.

The White truck had a 7-ton carrying capacity (apparently the largest in Australia at the time), a four-cylinder side valve petrol motor and solid rubber tyres called super



cushion tyres.

Both the tipper body and the cab would have been built in Australia.

It's not clear where the photo was taken, but it definitely wasn't in Kyogle.

## Unity sculptures RESTORED

The carved wooden sculptures at Sandilands are being renovated thanks to the Kyogle and District Arts Council inc (KDAC) which received a grant through Kyogle Council's Bush Fire Recovery funding program.

The Unity Arch Sandilands Triangle sculptures were created in the early 1980s through a community project implemented by Tryphena McShane and Phillip Innes.

The sculptures sit like totems on parkland at the intersection of the Summerland Way and Clarence Way and where created as an expression of peace and unity, using timber that linked west of the range communities, from Tabulam, Drake, Mallanganee, Woodenbong, Urbenville, Old

Bonalbo and Bonalbo.

About 50 people contributed their carving skills and creative designs to produce eight worked blocks with a ninth bloke positioned in the center of the sculptural circle that was roughly prepared to encourage others to engrave their marks into.

Sadly, the maintenance of these sculptures was never kept up and over the years they deteriorated and weathered to a point where only some have been able to be reinvigorated to their former glory.

KDAC member and local woodworker Paul Tiernan has been project managing the revitalisation of these sculptures with some amazing results.

Big Scrub Salvage in Lismore were able to source Australian White Beech timber from Du-



for replacing the damaged poles, a local owner of a wood whizz then machined the tops and bottoms flat.

Col Garrard has capped the new poles of wood and will

complete the rest of the capping to the onsite sculptures once Gerard Donachy and Paul Tiernan complete cleaning and oiling the sculptures.

A special thanks to Stuart Larsson at Mara Seeds for generously providing a water tank and pump onsite for this work to be undertaken.

A maintenance plan will be drawn up and presented to Kyogle Council on the completion of work so these amazing sculptures can live on.

The project will see the surviving sculptures restored and an opportunity to re-engage people in this area in participating in carving the new poles.
