



\$2M grant to upgrade KYOGLE CBD

Kyogle Council has received a \$2,048,312 grant to upgrade the Kyogle Central Business District (CBD).

The grant was announced by Federal Member for Page Kevin Hogan.

"These upgrades will help to support existing businesses by encouraging the community to shop locally and drawing in more visitors," Mr Hogan said.

"It will also provide spaces that can be utilised for a range of community events and gatherings.

"Work will include landscaping improvements such as street trees and gardens, outdoor kerb side dining areas, new seating, recycling bins, and street furniture.

"Traffic improvements will include a 40km/h pedestrian area, intersection improvements, cycling lanes and disabled parking spaces."

The developments will start from the intersection at Wyangarie Street through to the intersection at Kyogle Road.

Kyogle Council Mayor Kylie Thomas welcomed the funding and said it would be a

great development for the town.

"We can be very proud of what we have achieved in partnership with the Federal Government," Cr Thomas said.

The grants funding was provided through the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

Meanwhile, the public consultation period

for the revised Kyogle CBD Masterplan closed on 18 February 2022.

The feedback from the public consultation will be considered by Councillors at a forthcoming meeting, with the community to be provided with updates on how and when the project will proceed in the near future.

CLARENCE WAY project on temporary pause

Council has been undertaking a major upgrade of the Clarence Way for the full length between the local government boundary near Urbenville through to Woodenbong since mid 2021.

The project was made possible by \$3 million in funding from the NSW Government and \$2 million from the Federal Government, with Council contributing up to \$2 million to allow the full length to be completed.

Construction works on site have currently been paused due to an issue identified with the final layer of pavement material.

Council is working closely with its suppliers and contractors to verify the exact nature of the issue and the treatment required.

Council wishes to reassure the community that it remains focused on rectifying these issues as soon as possible so that the project can be completed as originally planned.

FREE TRAINING for disaster volunteers

Local community members and volunteers are invited to take part in a free half-day training session on how the area's Community Managed Evacuation Centres operate.

Community Managed Evacuation Centres were developed by Council together with other agencies including Red Cross to cover villages in the Kyogle local government area which can become isolated in emergencies such as floods or bushfires.

Community members in some of these villages have volunteered to set up temporary evacuation centres until disaster welfare organisations can arrive.

Red Cross will be delivering the half day training sessions. The training will include: information on the different roles in evacuation centres; supports and services availa-

ble; practical tips, tools and resources.

Carbon farming can HELP KOALAS

Kyogle Council is helping spread the word about Koala friendly carbon farming – an environmental plantings project that benefits koalas and other native species as well as farmers and land managers.

This project, which sees WWF Australia partner with Climate Friendly, gives landholders potential to receive additional income from growing trees while contributing to emissions reduction and providing critical habitat for koalas.

The main requirement is land that is suitable for planting koala habitat, has a reasonable carbon yield and is at least 25 ha. The WWF is providing the trees, labour and ongoing maintenance and monitoring for three years. target roads, bridges

Council's bridge program pushes on with completion of the new bridge on Dunns Road in February.

Heaslips Bridge on Babyl Creek Road was also completed in February, finishing up the last bridge replacement for Babyl Creek Road.

The replacement of Campbell Bridge on Wyndham Road is on track to be completed and open to traffic in early March.

Progress on the replacement of Cedar Point Bridge on Edenville Road has suffered delays due to wet weather and supply issues.

Council's contractor advises that completion of the bridge is expected in May (weather permitting)

New bridges are currently under construction by Council on Mahoney Lane, Gorge Creek Road, Saunders Road, and Wynlea Road as well as the Wyndham Road project already mentioned.

Replacement of the collapsed culvert on Hootons Road has commenced and should take two months to complete. Council would like to thank the community for their patience while waiting for the com-

pletion of this project.

Roads crews have been busy with a multitude of projects.

The Afterlee Road rehabilitation was completed in February. Work continues on the Clarence Way at Sandilands with road rehabilitation, widening, and minor road realignment.

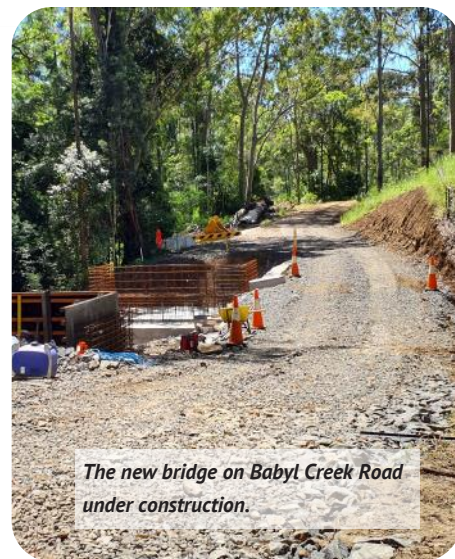
Work is also progressing well on the Bruxner Highway project at Mallanganee Range where Council is carrying out road rehabilitation and drainage improvements on behalf of Transport for NSW.

In February, Council also commenced rehabilitation of a sealed section of Theresa Creek Road.

Pavement patching on various roads within the network commenced at the end of January and will continue until mid-March.

Gravel road pothole patching has been undertaken on Green Pigeon Road, Killaloe Road, Collins Valley Road, Karina Place, sections of Hillyards Road, Dyraaba Road, Horseshoe Creek Road, Wiangaree Back Road, and Homestead Road.

This interim measure is being trialled to improve conditions on roads that are waiting to be graded.



Council has received funding through the National Disaster Recovery and Resilience Arrangements to repair damage caused by flooding in November 2021.

This money is allocated to specific flood-impacted infrastructure.

This means, that in some cases, instead of grading a whole road as usual, only a flood-damaged section may be graded and re-gravelled before the crew and equipment moves on to another location.

Illegal dumping is costly

FOR EVERYONE

Did you know that placing household or commercial waste in public bins is illegal?

The purpose of Council-provided public bins in community reserves and open spaces is to capture waste generated by the public who are using these spaces for activities such as recreation and sport. Providing these public bins assists in preventing littering.

It is illegal to dump household or commercial waste in public bins as it could lead to overflowing bins, vermin and odour issues, as well as polluting local waterways and our nationally listed State Forests and National Parks.

Council encourages everyone to report any dumping if you see it happen or come across illegally dumped items (by using RIDonline <https://ridonline.epa.nsw.gov.au/#/home> or phoning Kyogle Council).

Persons identified illegally dumping

household or commercial waste material may be fined:

- up to \$1,100 for acting contrary to notices erected by Council
- up to \$4,000 for individuals or \$8,000 for corporations for dumping waste
- up to \$250,000 for individuals or \$1,000,000 for corporations for more severe cases
- up to \$1,000,000 for individuals or \$5,000,000 for corporations and prison sentences for willful or negligent disposal of waste causing actual or likely harm to the environment, such as asbestos or hazardous chemicals.

Living at a rural residence is no excuse for dumping household waste in public bins. Kyogle LGA has a waste facility and three transfer stations for you to dispose of your waste appropriately.

If your item is clean and in good condition, you can sell, donate it to the Kyogle Tip Shop, a local op shop or give it away.

However, if the item is broken, dirty/stained or past its use by date, take it to

the Kyogle Waste Facility or one of our transfer stations at Woodenbong, Bonalbo and Mallanganee.

You can visit Kyogle's Community Recycling Centre (at the Kyogle Waste Facility) or a Community Recycling Station to recycle problem waste items such as batteries, light bulbs, printer cartridges and oil.

Reducing the items entering the waste stream reduces the impact on the environment and the above options are often cheaper or even free.

Let's all work together to get rid of illegal dumping and recycle wherever we can.

Fact of the month

Kyogle Council estimates that illegal dumping cost the community more than \$40,000 last year alone.

Working with fabrics and other materials, members of the Kyogle Quilters have been regularly gathering to share skills in needlework and sewing techniques.

Quilts and Beyond will drape the Roxy Gallery space until 3 April 2022.

In this exhibition, 14 women come together to display their needlework talents in a variety of styles.

This group of friends have regularly gathered together as the Kyogle Quilters for sewing days and have encouraged each other to learn and develop skills and techniques of sewing -- hand piecing and machine piecing, applique, needle turn, embroidery, fabric and thread painting and Sashiko (Japanese stitching).

In applying the simple techniques of quilting, the group has discovered the thousands of quilting patterns available to follow and that has led them to trying

many other sewing techniques.

As well as quilts, group members have created decorative wall hangings, table runners, place mats, children's toys, and material books for children, handbags, clothing and the list goes on.

All of these creations will be available for purchase at the group's first exhibition at the Roxy Gallery.

The exhibition's official opening will take place on Friday 11 March from 6-8pm. The evening will provide the perfect opportunity for people to meet and speak with members of the Kyogle Quilters Group.

BUSH FOOD garden established

Gullibul First Nations peoples, in partnership with Landcare NSW, Kyogle Council, and Kyogle Landcare have established a native bushfood garden, behind Kyogle Recreation Reserve.

It can be found at the beginning of the Fawcett's Creek Bush Walk.

Aunty Vera Walker said the garden would give people the opportunity to learn to identify some edible native plants and their healing uses.

She said the aim was to develop a seed bank of rare native plants and to continue cultural education by Gullibul First Nations people, in collaboration with Kyogle Landcare, the local community, and visitors to the area.

In January, about 50 people attended an event at the Kyogle Memorial Institute Hall to learn more about the garden and the creation of a totem pole which has been erected at the garden.

Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Kylie Thomas, Deputy Mayor Cr Tom Cooper, Member for Lismore Janelle Saffin and North Coast Landcare Aboriginal Liaison Officer Michael Kennedy, were among those in attendance.

Uncle Wayne Walker talked about his unique style and pyro-etching technique which he used to create the totem on a 2.3 metre ironbark flitch.

He embossed the flitch with symbols and animals that represent the cultural significance of four yearly initiations, trails, rivers, water holes, and campsites.

The etchings are of Aborigi-

nal totems the Bingi (Turtle), Gurriman, (Kangaroo) – other names Whip Tail, Flaty, Grey Flats, Waribu, Red Rump, and Ngamal (Goanna) – also are etched on the Totem Pole.

A presentation on cultural bushfoods was delivered by Uncle Andrew Johnston.

He talked about the native plants and their healing properties. Native bushfoods were part of the refreshments.

Among the native plants in the bushfood garden at the Kyogle Recreation Reserve are Muntries, Native Guava, Native Peppermint, Finger Lime, Native Mulberry, Native Grape, Plum Pinex, Riberry, Salt Bush, Apple Berry, Cape Gooseberry, Gummi Gummi, Bush Macadamia, and Aniseed Myrtle. Have you seen this invasive WATER WEED?

Frogbit (*Limnobium laevigatum*), is a fast-growing, floating aquatic weed that poses significant threat to our already struggling local waterways.

Forming dense mats, Frogbit threatens native aquatic animals by reducing available food and shelter and inhibiting light to native water plants. It can block waterways and irrigation channels and limit recreational water activities.

There are currently three known locations in our region of this invasive water weed - at Chinderah, Dorrroughby and a recent sighting at Swan Bay which are being actively managed, but we need your help to find more!

This weed is listed as high risk and is a State and regional target for prevention. It is therefore classified as Prohibited Matter.

Frogbit can be identified by its bright green, round fleshy leaves, up to 4cm across. Young leaves float flat on the water surface and have a spongy underside, and



as they mature grow above the water surface and lose their sponginess. Flowers are small and white.

The fruit is a berry-like capsule that develops underwater, containing up to 100 floating seeds which are easily dispersed by water or wind once released and can remain viable for at least three years.

Frogbit can also spread vegetatively, when fragments attach to animals or water equipment and are transported to new areas.

Similar looking plants include the native Frogbit (*Hydrocharis dubia*) which also occurs in our region, although has larger leaves (up



to 6cm long) and flowers are 2-3 cm across with three round white petals and yellow centres.

Please do not attempt to treat or dispose of Frogbit yourself. If you see this plant, report it immediately to Rous County Council on (02) 6623 3800.

Rous will lead an initial response for the treatment and disposal of the plant to stop it from spreading.
