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\$20M IN FUNDING for Clarence Way upgrade

Thirty-one kilometres of the Clarence Way between Bonalbo and Urbenville will be upgraded thanks to a \$16 million grant from the Australian Government through its Remote Roads Upgrade Program (RRUP).

Kyogle Council also will contribute \$4 million to the project.

Federal Member for Page Kevin Hogan announced the funding at Bonalbo last month.

"The Clarence Way is a critical route connecting the Bonalbo and Urbenville communities however the road is currently in exceptionally poor condition," Mr Hogan said.

"This upgrade will see significant safety improvements including pavement widening and strengthening as well as drainage and delineation improvements.

"Importantly, the upgrade will ensure locals, businesses and other road users get to their destination safer and sooner."

Mr Hogan said the RRUP help local government fund road upgrades which may

otherwise be unaffordable.

"Our government recognises the costs to upgrade rural and regional roads is often prohibitive for local governments, which is why we are committed to providing this vital funding under RRUP," he said.

Kyogle Council Mayor Kylie Thomas described the announcement as truly great for the region.

"Kyogle Council has worked tirelessly to

highlight the absolutely key role that the Clarence Way plays in connecting our communities and businesses, and thanks the Federal Government for providing this critical funding support," Cr Thomas said.

"The upgrade will benefit locals each and every day – making each trip safer and more comfortable and also kickstarting further community growth and development."



from the Mayor ...



In response to rebuilding after the floods last month, the State Government will be setting up a Reconstruction Corporation by 1 July this year. It will be operational for at least

3-5 years until the region is fully functional again.

The NSW Premier Dominic Perrottet told Mayors via teleconference over the Easter long weekend that we can expect to see our flood projects prioritized, jobs and economic growth promoted in our regions with housing and roads being top on the list.

The Mayors in turn informed the Premier of the different challenges and problems facing each of our councils. Although we have a long way to go as a

region, we hope that with the help of our dedicated State and Federal Ministers we will see the funding required to rebuild our towns, villages and workplaces.

The rebuild will take time. Again, Council appreciates the cooperation of local residents and businesses, especially those in rural areas who are trying to operate their businesses in difficult circumstances and on damaged roads.

The Recovery Centre which had been operating in Kyogle since the floods has helped many people get access to the support and financial assistance they need.

After much time spent with the community, Council has adopted the Kyogle Civic Heart Masterplan.

The Civic Heart Precinct - Stratheden Street, library and forecourt area – is stage one of the overall masterplan which also incorporates the main street.

Tenders will be called by August 2022, with preliminary works to upgrade the

Civic Heart expected to commence before the end of the year.

The project will be completed during 2023.

This type of development in the CBD of Kyogle is to put into action the kind of improvements that the community have expressed over the last few years; well-maintained public spaces that enable people to get together and events like the Saturday Markets, Pumpkin Festival, Writers Festival will benefit from a fit for purpose location.

Meanwhile, in response to community feedback, Council has decided to investigate options for the long-term management of traffic, including parking, in the main street before proceeding with the main street component of the plan.

Once that has been completed, the community will have further opportunities to comment on how the main street redevelopment will proceed.

COMMENT sought on draft CSP

The community has until Thursday, 12 May to comment on Kyogle Council's new Community Strategic Plan (CSP).

The CSP aims to identify the community's vision for the future of the Kyogle Local Government Area (LGA) over the next 10 years, set goals in achieving that vision and identify what Council, and its partners, will do to achieve those goals.

All NSW Council must have their new CSP adopted by 30 June 2022.

Council launched a community survey on 7 March to assist with the development of the CSP and held information sessions throughout the LGA in early May to get further input. Council now is calling on community members to provide further input on the draft CSP 2022-2032, which it adopted for public exhibition at its 11 April 2022

meeting.


The draft CSP builds on progress already made through implementation of 'Ready to Grow', Council's previous Community Strategic Plan.

It has been developed based on community feedback, as well as analysis of local economic, environmental and social trends.

The draft CPS recognises the need to get the 'basics' right – better roads, reliable telecommunications, well-maintained public spaces and great community facilities.

It also reflects the community's growing desire for action in the areas of environmental protection, sustainability and resilience to change and natural disasters.

CLARENCE WAY

community update

Council has been undertaking a major upgrade of the Clarence Way for the full length between the local government boundary near Urbenville through to Woodenbong since mid-2021.

The project was made possible by \$3 million of funding from the NSW Government and \$2million of funding from the Australian Government, with Council contributing up to \$2 million of its own funding to allow the full length to be completed.

Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Kylie Thomas said construction works were paused in December 2021 when the project was nearing completion, due to signs of premature pavement failure.

"Council has since engaged independent consultants to undertake sampling and testing of the material supplied for the project, with a report on the final results provided to Council this month," Cr Thomas said.

"The report shows that the material supplied across the segments showing signs of premature failure, does not conform to the required specifications."

Council has prepared a detailed estimate of the cost of the repair works based on the test results obtained, involving stabilisation of the existing pavement materials, and an overlay of compliant pavement material from an alternate source of quarry materials. This repair methodology will avoid the excessive time delays and costs associated with removal and full replacement of the unsuitable material, whilst still achieving the required



pavement strength and longevity.

When Council resolves to accept tenders under the contract for the supply of quarry products, the tenderers are required to hold a suitable level of Public and Product Liability Insurance coverage, as protection against this kind of event.

As such, Council is seeking appropriate compensation for the cost of repairing the road throughout these affected segments.

Kyogle Council Mayor Cr Kylie Thomas said the situation is unfortunate.

"Despite all the hard work and best efforts of the Council staff and contractors involved in the project, the material supplied did not meet the required specifications, and this has led to premature failures throughout the works," Cr Thomas said.

"Councillors and Council staff are working together to ensure that the project can be completed as originally planned, and as soon as possible," Cr Thomas said

"In the meantime, Council staff will continue to monitor the road and undertake any works needed to ensure continuity of service.

"I also take this opportunity to thank the community for their patience, and apologise for the extended delays in completing the project and any inconvenience caused."

COUNCIL TO hold mayoral referendum

Kyogle Council will hold a constitutional referendum to determine if ratepayers and residents want to have a popularly elected Mayor.

A majority of Councillors at the April meeting of Council voted in favour of holding the referendum and of conducting an education campaign, before the referendum, on the pros and cons of a popularly elected Mayor.

The referendum will be held at the next local

government elections which are scheduled to be held in September 2024.

For a constitutional referendum to pass, a majority of voters in the council area must have voted in support of the proposal.

Voting in a constitutional referendum is compulsory and the result is binding on the council.

If the constitutional referendum is passed, the result takes effect at the next local government elections (currently scheduled for September 2028).

A popularly elected mayor holds office for the term of the elected Council, usually four years.

Swimming pools **CLOSED**

Council's three public swimming pools have closed for the off season.

The Kyogle, Woodenbong and Bonalbo pools closed on April 25 and will re-open for the 2022-2023 swimming season on Saturday 24 September, 2022.



Illegal dumping, littering ON THE RISE

Illegal dumping of waste causes significant environmental, social and financial impacts for Kyogle Council and the community.

When Council receives a report about illegal dumping, staff investigate the incident, clean up dumped waste and take enforcement action when the responsible party can be identified.

However, until recently, Council has not had the opportunity to look at the overall issue of illegal dumping in throughout the Kyogle local government area (LGA).

In 2021 the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) provided Kyogle Council with a \$20,000 grant to collate data about illegal dumping in the Kyogle LGA.

This project has allowed Council to gain a good understanding of the type of waste dumped, location of incidents, hotspots, estimated costs and waste volumes throughout our LGA.

What have we found out?

Illegal dumping and littering is more prevalent within our community than previously perceived.

Since 2009, the number of reports about illegal dumping has been steadily increasing (see Figure 1). 2021 saw a significant in-




crease (40%) in the number of dumping cases reported as a result of the Illegal Dumping Project.

Household waste (51%) and abandoned vehicles (24%) are the two most prevalent types of illegally dumped waste in Kyogle LGA (see Figure 2).

Dumping household waste in public bins in our parks and gardens and dumping waste and littering is a shared responsibility. at rest stops are two of the most common illegal dumping behaviours occurring in our LGA.

Council estimates that illegal dumping is costing ratepayers around \$40,000 per year to investigate and clean-up. However, the real cost is likely to be much higher, as many incidents are still going unreported. What are we going to do about it?

In response to the findings of the Illegal Dumping Project, Council is developing an Illegal Dumping and Litter Prevention Strat-

The aim of the strategy will be to identify what actions are needed to reduce the incidents of illegal dumping generally, but also target specific hotspots identified as part of the Illegal Dumping Project.

Reducing the impacts of illegal dumping

Kyogle Council, local businesses, land managers, community groups and the local community all have a role to play in making sure we protect our LGA from the adverse impacts of littering and illegal dumping.

If you see someone dumping waste somewhere they shouldn't be, or find waste that has been dumped in our LGA, make sure you report it to Council or via RIDonline at https://ridonline.epa.nsw.gov.au/#/home

DRAFT BUDGET delivers a wealth of works

Kyogle Council has released a draft \$190 million four-year budget to deliver the services our community needs and expects, Kyogle Mayor Cr Kylie Thomas said.

Council adopted the draft budget at its April meeting is seeking public comment through its annual budget consultation process.

"Having just experienced some of the

worst flooding in our area's history, this is welcome news for our community," Mayor Thomas said.

"The budget sees the continuation of the largest bridge replacement program in the State, with around 90 bridges being replaced across a two-year period, at a cost of more than \$50 million.

"There is \$60 million in the 2022/2023 budget including;

- \$22.3 million for bridge replacements
- \$1.35 million for regional roads

- \$3.5 million for rural local roads
- \$1.7 million for urban streets
- \$3.1 million for building and community facilities including
- \$104,000 for financial assistance dona-

Heart plan adopted

At its April Ordinary Meeting of Council, Council considered the Kyogle Civic Precinct Masterplan Project. This project has two main components – redevelopment of the Kyogle Main Street (Summerland Way) and redevelopment of the Civic Heart Precinct (Stratheden Street/Library Forecourt area).

The original Draft Masterplan was revised following significant public comment and feedback received during the first round of public consultation in June 2021.

The revised Draft Masterplan underwent a subsequent round of public consultation between December 2021 – February 2022. Community interest in the project remains very strong and Council received a large number of submission in response to the

revised Draft Masterplan.

There was clear community support for redevelopment of the Civic Heart Precinct subject to clarification and refinement of some design elements such as amount of grassed space, supporting infrastructure and installations and the proposed planting regime and species.

The landscape design for the Civic Heart Precinct was amended to reflect this feedback and Council resolved at its April meeting to adopt the Kyogle Civic Heart Landscape Design.

Community feedback on the revised redevelopment of the Kyogle Main Street showed considerable support for the "greening" of the main street in principle, however there are still substantial reservations about key elements of the plan - in

particular, the potential loss of car parking spaces and other traffic management issues.

As a result, Council has decided to investigate options for the long-term management of traffic in the Kyogle Main Street, including provision of car parking spaces required to support the sustainable growth of the Kyogle business district, before further consideration of a plan for redevelopment of the Main Street.

When this work is completed, it is intended that a further revision of the Summerland Way component of the Masterplan will be prepared, accompanied by an overarching proposal for the provision of car parking in and around the CBD.

The revised package will be subject to a final round of public consultation.

SOME DA fees waived

Council will permanently waive the development application, assessment and inspection fees and charges for a range of community infrastructure projects.

The waiver will apply to projects funded by the State or Federal Governments and which are on land managed by a Community Trust, Crown Land Manager or sporting club.

In recent years, several local community groups and land managers have been successful in securing State and Federal Government funding for projects to maintain and develop community infrastructure and stimulate local economies in the wake of bushfire, drought, flood and the COVID-19 pandemic.

The projects include maintaining or upgrading existing community facilities, installing new structures and amenities at community sporting grounds and showgrounds and making improvements to community halls.

These projects can require development consent from Council, and often the development process costs, which can add up depending on the complexity and scale of the project, were not included in the community group's budget.

Council agreed at it April meeting to assist community groups to deliver these vital projects by waiving Council development fees and charges.

While community groups will still need to meet costs such as consultant fees for preparing information required to support a development application and statutory State Government fees and charges, it is hoped the waiver of Council fees will ensure that funding is spent on what matters most – infrastructure for our community.

Community groups are encouraged to contact Council's Planning Services team for advice on whether development consent is required for a project and how to submit a development application if required.

25 BRIDGES replaced since June

Council has replaced 25 bridges since June 2021 as part of its once in a generation bridge building program.

Council aims to replace 93 aging timber bridges over a two-year period from June 2021 to June 2022 as part of the program which is being funded through the State Government's Fixing Country Bridges Program (FCB) (\$40.419M) and the Federal Government's Bridge Renewal Program (\$1.535M). Council is also contributing \$8.86M to the project.

At any one time, Council has between five and six active bridge construction sites on the go, with Council currently using a mix of internal resources and local contractors to complete the works.

The wet weather and catastrophic flooding in recent
months significantly slowed the
bridge building program with
many of Council's crews being
redeployed to emergency restoration works.

•

However, the bridge building program is ramping back up to



full production, with Council expecting work to recommence on six sites at the start of May.

Council has used its standard steel girder and precast concrete deck bridge design to replace the majority of the bridges to date. Most of the components for this type of bridge are manufactured off site which allows Council to keep the time on site to a minimum (steel girders manufactured off site, precast concrete deck units from a local manufacturer, reinforcement cages prefabricated at Council's Woodenbong depot).

- Mahoneys Lane
- Gorge Creek Road
- Saunders Road
- Walsh Road
- Cedar Point Bridge Edenville Road – construction by a local contractor.


The elements of interpreting words in to visuals and visuals into words intrigues and expands how viewers perceive what is created.

two new bridges, despite rain

Amidst the disturbance and changing road network conditions of the past month, Council was very happy to open new bridges on Wyndham Road and Wynlea Road and to start construction of new bridges at Walsh Road, Mahoneys Lane, and Gorge Creek Road.

At the end of April, preparations were also underway for commencement of the Old Tweed Road bridge replacement and piling works for the bridge replacement on Saunders Road.

At the time of writing, crews are working to restore through access of Lillian Rock Road with the road expected to be open to one lane by the end of April.

Kyogle Road at the Cawongla Range landslip will be open to two lanes of traffic in the week after the ANZAC Day longweekend

Investigation and design work carried out in March and April is being utilised to de-

velop and refine the program of works for restoration at all major landslips in the local government area. The program will accompany Council's application for assistance under the State and Commonwealth funded Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements.

Restoration work commenced at Theresa Creek Road in April and will continue into

May.

This work involves rehabilitation segments of the bitumen road including the steep hill near Dugans Road.

Work will shortly recommence at the Sandilands rehabilitation project which involves road rehabilitation, widening, and minor realignment of a stretch of Clarence Way.
