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NEW THREE BIN service starts mid 2023

From 1 July next year, ratepayers with a kerbside domestic waste collection service will be provided with a new three-bin service that provides separate bins for general waste, comingled recyclables and food and garden organics (FOGO).

Rural residents without a kerbside collection service will also be offered a small portable FOGO bin to enable them to collect FOGO waste for disposal at Council's waste facilities or to compost on their own property.

Moving to a three-bin service will provide residents with the chance to significantly reduce their impact on the environment by ensuring even more materials are recycled and diverted from landfill.

An audit of Council's kerbside bins in late 2021, found that 49% of waste placed in household bins was FOGO.

FOGO can be recycled into compost which contains nutrients and energy that are lost if this material is landfilled. Decomposition of FOGO also produces odours, leachate and greenhouse gases which can adversely affect the environment and public health.

Therefore, sending FOGO to landfill is not only a waste of a valuable resource but a waste of valuable landfill space.

The introduction of a FOGO service will also ensure that Council complies with a State Government mandate under the *NSW Waste and Sustainable Materials Strategy 2041*. The mandate requires Council to provide all households and selected businesses (eg supermarkets, hospitality businesses and other businesses that generate large amounts of food waste) with a FOGO collection service by 2030.

The new service will mean that Kyogle Council ratepayers will receive the same waste collection and

Community Resilience GRANTS OPEN

Applications for Council's Community Resilience Grants have now opened.

Community groups, businesses and individuals are invited to apply for funding of up to \$25,000, or \$50,000 with a minimum 10 percent co-contribution, to deliver community-led activities and initiatives that build resilience in our communities.

Council's Community Resilience Grants program is funded through the NSW Severe Weather and Flood Event Grant 2022.

Successful grant applications will address community, economic, asset or environmental resilience and contribute to at least one of the following disaster recovery outcomes:

1. The needs of vulnerable groups are addressed in disaster recovery
2. The community is aware of the disaster recovery processes
3. The community can express its changing disaster recovery needs
4. Community members are aware of the risks of future disasters
5. The community has improved capacity and capability to respond to future disasters
6. Business and not-for-profits have in

place adequate mitigation practices for risks and threats

7. Government, private sector, civil society and organisations are engaged in plans for preparedness and management of the recovery.

Grant applications close Monday, 31 October, 2022.

Council forced to triage ROAD REPAIRS

With more than 1200 items of damage plus 70 major landslips across our road and bridge network caused by the catastrophic February/March floods, Council, like an emergency room at a hospital, is triaging its response to this unprecedented natural disaster.

Council does not have the resources, materials or workforce to fix all road failures immediately, so we are focusing on addressing the most critical problems first, while waiting for Natural Disaster Relief Funding to be approved.

So far, Council has been approved \$17 million to fix just 300 of the 1200 major failures.

Immediately after the floods, we gave priority to re-establishing basic access to residents completely cut off and repairing defects that could be life threatening such as landslides.

Our second priority was providing access to agribusiness reliant on feed and other deliveries to maintain animal welfare (such as piggeries, poultry farms, and feedlots) or milk retrieval from dairy farms.

With disaster relief funding starting to come in, Council is now turning its focus to all-wheel-drive and heavy vehicle access across the road network.

We are starting with our high traffic regional roads that link our communities, then moving on to major collector-catchment roads that service a locality, school bus routes, and then local access roads (small, low traffic dead end roads that service a small number of residents).

Council is also doing what it can, with

the resources available, to undertake pothole patching when possible. However, while roads with numerous potholes are an inconvenience and the cause of discomfort and driver frustration, they are not generally considered dangerous if negotiated at an appropriate speed. In some localised cases, an appropriate speed may be as slow as a crawl.

While Council continues with the mammoth task of rebuilding our damaged road network, we are asking people to adjust their driving to take into account potential hazards. That means slowing down, allowing more time to undertake journeys, avoiding non-essential travel and being aware that there could be a major defect hidden around any corner. The sheer number of road issues means Council is unable to signpost all hazards.

Council would like to thank the many residents who have reported issues across our road network since the floods. The information has been essential in ensuring Council's effective response to the unfold-

ing disaster. Due to the incredibly high number of reports/submissions we have received, it's not been possible for us to respond to every person. However, if you want a formal written response, or who wish to speak to someone about your issues, then contact the Council's Customer Service team on 02 6632 1611 and ask for that follow up.

We have come a long way since the flood on 28 February, thanks to our incredible staff across all Council departments, local contractors who have been working alongside our work crews, our community who have been Council's eyes and ears, and our local and regional emergency services.

But due to the extent of the damage to the road network, it will be several years before all repairs are completed.

This is not ideal, but it is the reality of a natural disaster of this kind. We ask our community for their ongoing patience and understanding as we continue the recovery over the coming months and years.

FOGO TO BE diverted from landfill

recycling services as all other Northern Rivers councils including Tweed, Byron, Ballina, Lismore, Richmond Valley and Clarence Valley.

It is estimated that the new three-bin service will only cost households an extra \$4 per week. This is because the new service also will result in savings as diversion of FOGO from landfill will reduce the amount of

waste levy Council pays to the EPA annually and increase the lifespan of the current landfill.

Council has been successful in obtaining a \$500,000 grant from the Environmental Protection Agency's Organics Infrastructure Fund to assist in implementing the FOGO service.

More information about the new service, including education materials to assist ratepayers to use the new three-bin service correctly, will be provided in early 2023.

REGISTERING your pet is the law

There is an increasing number of people in the local government area who are not registering their dogs.

Residents are reminded that if you are keeping a dog on your property you are required to microchip and register it by the age of six months.

Registering your pet is the law and also ensures that if your pet gets lost, they can be safely and quickly returned to you, provided your contact details are up to date.

And the good news is that it is now easier than ever to register your pet:

1. Online – Registrations can be completed online via the NSW Pet Registry (<https://www.petregistry.nsw.gov.au/#/>) or Service NSW using your MyServiceNSW Account (<https://www.service.nsw.gov.au/>)
2. Over the counter – You can also register your pet in person at any Service NSW Centre or at Council's Administration Centre by completing a simple form.

Please note that a once only lifetime regis-

tration fee applies (see below for current fees). You can claim a reduced registration fee in certain circumstances (eg if your dog has been desexed by six months of age, you are a pensioner) but you must provide proof as required on the registration form.

Fees

- Animal is not desexed or desexed after relevant age—\$234
- Animal is desexed by relevant age—\$69
- Animal is owned by a pensioner—\$29
- Animal is working dog on a farm—nil

If Council finds that your dog isn't microchipped and registered, you will receive a letter from Council providing you 21 days to do so.

If the NSW Companion Animal Register still shows your animal as unregistered after this period, Council will issue you with a penalty notice of \$330 per animal.

As you can see the cost of registration is much less than the fine amount, so please make sure you register your dog when requested.

Council urges all pet owners to take their

responsibilities seriously and ensure their dogs are identified and registered.

Free energy audits for BUSINESSES

Kyogle Council is partnering with The Green Guys Group to offer free audits for LED lighting and solar to businesses throughout the Kyogle local government area (LGA).

The LED lighting audit is open to all businesses, however the solar audit is only available to businesses with a minimum daily energy consumption of 100kw/hr per day.

As part of the audit, the Green Guys Group, one of Australia's largest renewable energy companies, will provide participating businesses with a tailored business case which provides a full analysis of site energy usage, current cost of energy, savings which could be generated by a renewable upgrade, rebates payable to the site owner, a payment plan (if required) and other details.

You will then be contacted by The Green Guys Group to organise a site visit.

In advance of a site visit and to enable The Green Guys Group assessors to create accurate proposals, businesses seeking a LED lighting audit will need to provide the following information to them via email: business name and ABN; a full (all pages) copy of a recent electricity bill (pre-COVID); street address; and building floor plan (if available).

Businesses wanting a solar audit will need to provide all of the above plus a Google Maps image of the roof to be used for solar and roof type (material). For further information contact Judy Faulks by email or phone 6632 1611.



THREE NEW bridges built in June

June saw the opening of bridges on Gooleys Road, Mahoneys Lane, and Saunders Road, along with the long-awaited bridge on Old Tweed Road which has returned that road to a loop road. Bridges were commenced on Asperys Road, Castille Road, Brumby Plains Road, and Bingebeebebra Road with work continuing on the bridge replacement on Walsh Road.

With much lower rainfall in June, Council was able to make good progress on the pavement works on Bruxner Highway at Mallanganee Range.

The lower section of that project is well underway and should be sealed at the beginning of July. There is also a Transport for NSW crew on site

carrying out stabilizing and reinforcing where landslips have undermined the highway.

Other road improvement projects in June included Council carrying out asphalt surfacing on Roxy Lane between Geneva Street and Anzac Drive and a Roads and Maritime Services re-sheeting project on Summerland Way at the northern approach to Kyogle near the showgrounds.



Council is making good progress on pavement works on the Bruxner Highway at Mallanganee Range and expects to seal this section at the beginning of July.

COUNCIL TO CONDUCT CCTV inspections of stormwater pipes

Council will be undertaking a significant amount of stormwater pipe CCTV inspections around the local government area over the next couple of months.

All residents should be aware that while this work is carried out, they may see Council staff and contractors in various locations in towns and villages in our LGA undertaking these works.

Residents who live near a stormwater access pit or have a stormwater access pit in their backyard should also be aware that Council may need to get to it. Further information will be given to specific residents closer to the date of access.

More support provided for FLOOD VICTIMS

Residents living permanently in caravan parks and retirement villages and residents of multiple tenancies can now apply for the NSW Government's Back Home Grant, helping restore flood-damaged property and replace essential items.

Changes to the Back Home Grant guidelines mean that:

- Permanent residents of caravan parks and retirement villages who own their dwellings, whether fixed or movable, are now eligible to apply for the \$20,000 owner occupier grant;
- Tenants who have lease agreements for a dwelling that is on the same land as another eligible dwelling (for example, a granny flat) will be able to apply for the \$5,000 tenants' grant; and
- Tenants with a lease agreement in a dwelling that has been divided into multiple self-contained residences, but not formally through a subdivision or strata process, will be able to apply for the \$5,000 tenants' grant.

Rate relief

The NSW Government will also pay the 2022-23 Council rates for flood affected residential, commercial and farm ratepayers.

Ratepayers whose main premises has been assessed as damaged by the SES in the initial damage assessment or who have made a successful claim for support for equivalent damage through Service NSW are automatically eligible.

The funding will be provided through Service NSW and rates payments will be made directly to council on ratepayers' behalf.

Service NSW will administer the program and eligible ratepayers will receive the relief automatically and do not have to contact Council to apply. Correspondence will come from the NSW Government in the coming weeks to confirm eligibility.

Eligible ratepayers will not need to take any action. Please note the relief will cover rates only and will not cover waste, sewer or water charges.

Rural Landholders Grant

Funding of up to \$25,000 is now available to flood-affected rural landholders who do not qualify for existing programs because they do not meet the 50% of income from primary production requirement.

The Rural Landholders Grant is for landholders who have holdings of at least 10ha of rural land and receive at least \$20,000 in income from primary production per year.

Once approved, eligible primary producers can access \$5,000 in assistance upfront, with a further \$20,000 in financial assistance available thereafter upon submission of valid tax invoices.

Floods light the way for WEED INVASION

Floods can bring about rapid changes to landscapes and light the way for opportunistic weed species to move in.

Weeds can travel through floodwater via seed or vegetatively and may travel huge distances from the original parent plant.

For this reason, Rous County Council is encouraging all landholders who have been flood affected, and those on high-risk pathways such as roads and watercourses, to be vigilant in checking their property for new weeds.

Weeds may take up to 12 months or even longer in some cases to become re-established so it is important to maintain regular weed checks on your property over the coming months.

You can get on top of weeds by:

- Monitoring areas inundated by flood water over the next 12 months (at least). Some weeds may not be visible until a year or two after the flood. If you do find new weeds that you can't

identify, get in touch with Rous County Council or Local Land Services to help with early identification, before they spread further.

- Weed propagules (seed or vegetative parts) can be readily dispersed in flood waters. For example, Job's tears, Monkey's comb and Frogbit all grow along creeklines and may have been dispersed by the recent floods.
- Weed seeds can easily attach to vehicles and equipment in the muddy conditions after a flood. Ensure that vehicles and equipment, including those of contractors and advisors, are clean and free of weeds before entering or leaving your property. Consider providing a designated wash down area for this purpose.
- Pastures or crops may be left disturbed after the flood – a reduction of ground cover can allow weeds to grow and become established.
- If you have moved stock to higher ground or to different properties during the flood, be careful not to spread weeds from these holding areas when



you return stock to the flood impacted areas.

- Keep an eye out for weeds in fodder. Many agricultural weeds present in Queensland threaten our biosecurity in the Northern Rivers. Parthenium and Black knapweed are two to be on the look-out for.
