Council resolves to support VOICE TO PARLIAMENT

At the 10 July 2023 Ordinary Council meeting, Kyogle Council resolved to support a Voice to parliament. Council resolved:

That Council accepts the invitation of the First Nations People to walk with them by supporting the YES vote in the referendum to establish a Voice to parliament enshrined in the constitution.

That Council endorses the referendum on Creating an Aboriginal Voice to Parliament by providing information to the community in the Council newsletter and website, and takes opportunities to partner with agencies, local Aboriginal elders and community in presenting information on the Referendum to community members.

Through the Uluru Statement First Nations People have called on all Australians to support a First Nations Voice to Parliament by voting Yes in the upcoming referendum.

Kyogle Council accepts the invitation of

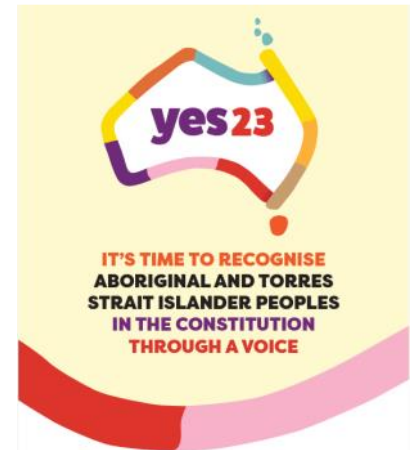
First Nations People to establish a Voice to parliament enshrined in the constitution, by supporting a YES vote in the upcoming referendum.

The Australian Government advises: In late 2023, Australians will have their say in a referendum about whether to change the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice.

The Voice would be an independent and permanent advisory body. It would give advice to the Australian Parliament and Government on matters that affect the lives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have called for members of the Voice to be chosen by First Nations peoples based on the wishes of local communities.

Mallanganeer Lookout shortlisted for World Architecture Festival Award

The Mallanganeer Lookout, including a striking, spheroid installation designed by architecture firm Terroir, has been shortlisted for a World Architecture Festival Award in the Future Projects section.

The visionary upgrade to the Mallanganeer Lookout is one of more than 30 Australian projects to make the short list, placing us in the top ten countries for total shortlisted projects, but the Mallanganeer Lookout is the only Aussie effort in the Leisure Led category.

The Lookout is a popular spot atop the Richmond Range, affording incredible views in all directions. The design of the new 'observatory' feature will encourage visitors to look up as well as out – the centre of our universe passes over the site daily. In addition, specialists have created an app in which a solar system will appear to float in front of visitors so they can identify what they see at night. The project has enjoyed strong community support, and it is expected that the Lookout will be a drawcard for tourists, helping to support local businesses in the area.



The Lookout is being funded by the NSW Government and Kyogle Council, and will include upgrades to the lookout access, parking and new toilets. New interpretation facilities will also be provided at the site, and it is envisaged that future stages could include a walking track and improved access to the Mallanganeer National Park. Construction of the Lookout is due to be completed by November 2024.

Let's recycle RIGHT

With the introduction of our new 3-bin waste collection system it is now more important than ever to Recycle Right!!

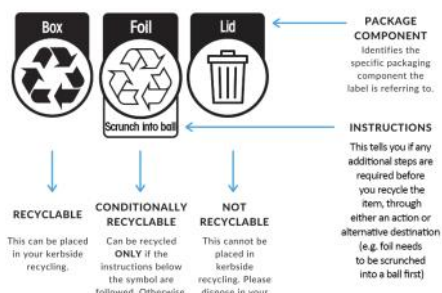
Every residential and commercial property that has a Council kerbside waste collection service received an education pack either in their kitchen caddy (residential properties) or with their new bins (commercial properties). This information pack included a brochure and handy fridge magnet explaining what items need to be put into your landfill bin (red-lid), recycling bin (yellow-lid) and food and organics bin (green-lid), and a card fridge magnet with tips on how to Recycle Right.

Council urges all residents and business owners to follow the information provided carefully to ensure that we are able to divert as much waste as possible from landfill. By doing so we will significantly reduce our impact on the environment and ease the burden of the State Government's Waste to Landfill levy which we pay on all waste that ends up in our landfill.

If you are not sure whether something belongs in your red, yellow or green-lid bin, please check out Council's new waste

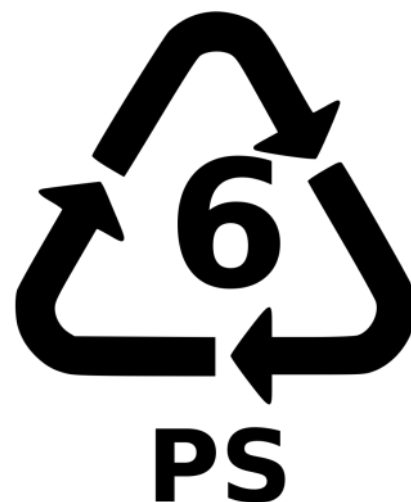
webpage which includes an A-Z guide on what can be placed in each bin and videos about how to recycle right. The waste webpage can be accessed at <https://www.kyogle.nsw.gov.au/infrastructure-environment/waste-water/waste-and-recycling/>.

You can also look for the Australasian Recycling Label (ARL) which can be found on the packaging of more and more products you buy in shops and supermarkets in Australia. The ARL outlines which bin the packaging belongs in and whether certain parts of the packaging need to be separated or recycled elsewhere. Please note that some of the labels will recommend soft plastics are returned to store. The REDcycle Program is currently on hold for the time being so please place your soft plastics in your red-lid landfill bin.



Did you know this symbol does not mean an item is recyclable?!

There are many plastic products with the numbers 1-7 displayed in a triangle. Unfortunately, they look very much like a recycling symbol. They are in fact a plastic identification code which identifies the type of plastic the packaging is made of and can be found on both recyclable and non-recyclable plastics. Please follow the ARL and Recycle Right tips on your fridge magnet and Council's website.



FREE DOG MICROCHIPPING and registration

Don't forget Kyogle Council will be providing free microchipping and registration for desexed dogs living in the Kyogle local government area during August.

In NSW, all dogs (other than exempt dogs) must be microchipped by 12 weeks of age, or before being sold or given away, whichever happens first. All dogs must also be registered by six months of age.

Normally a once-only registration fee is payable when you register your dog, which covers your dog for its lifetime in NSW, regardless of any changes in ownership. However, during August, Council will provide free microchipping and registration for dogs that have been desexed before reaching six months of age, dogs with written notification from a vet that they should not be desexed, or dogs kept by a recognised breeder for breeding purposes, saving pet owners up to \$100 per dog. In addition, every dog registered will receive a free care pack containing information and products to help you care for your dog. You will also go into the draw to win a Pinnacle Pet Fort Dog Kennel valued at up to \$270.

Council officers will be holding five mi-

crochipping and registration sessions in Kyogle, Woodenbong, Bonalbo, Tabulam and Mallanganeë in August (see locations and dates below). All you need to do is bring your dog to one of Council's free microchipping and registration sessions. Make sure you bring the following information with you:

If your dog is already microchipped, a copy of the Permanent Identification Form completed when your dog was microchipped

A letter, certificate or receipt from a vet confirming your dog is desexed or should not be desexed

If you are a recognised breeder, proof of current membership of Dogs NSW, documentation verifying the dog is a breed accepted by Dogs NSW and a signed statement that the dog is kept for breeding purposes.

Is your Health Premises REGISTERED?

Did you know that if you are operating a health premises in the Kyogle local government area, you must register your business with Council?

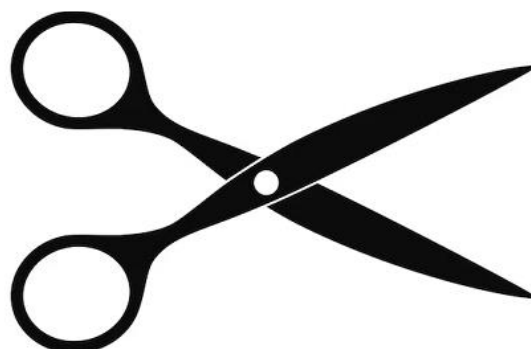
Health premises include hairdressing salons, barbers, beauty treatment salons, mortuaries and businesses where skin penetration practices are provided such as tattooing, body piercing, cosmetic enhancements, acupuncture (by non-registered health professionals) and waxing. If you are providing any of these services, whether it be from a fixed commercial premises, your own home, by visiting others in their home or in a public place (e.g. markets), your business must be registered with Council.

Council is also the regulatory authority for health premises in the Kyogle local government area. This role includes ensuring that health premises comply with the requirements of the *Public Health Act 2010* and *Local Government Act 1993*. As part of this role, Council is required to conduct regular inspections of businesses and undertake necessary action to remedy any breaches of legislative requirements to ensure community health and safety is maintained.

This month Council will be contacting all owners and operators

of known health premises in the Kyogle local government area to explain Council's role in regulating health premises and how to register their premises with Council. If you own or operate a health premises, please keep a look out for a letter from Council in the mail. If you don't receive a letter and you are operating a health premises, please contact Council's Environmental Health Officer by email council@kyogle.nsw.gov.au or telephone (02) 6632 1611.

have a facelift

The new bridges on Tims Lane, Macqueens Road, and Old Cob O Corn Road were opened to traffic in July along with the Allens Bridge replacement on Duck Creek Road. New bridges are currently under construction at Williams Road, Chestnut Road, Roseberry Creek Road, Boorabee Creek Road, Brown Knob Road, and Baileys Bridge Road.

Remediation of flood damage commenced on sealed sections of Deep Creek Road, Tunglebung Road, and Duck Creek Road in July and these projects will continue into August. Council is also awaiting approval of funding to remediate ten more sealed roads which suffered damage in the 2022 floods. The order of that work is carried out will depend on the order that funds are approved.

Remediation of flood damaged unsealed roads also continues with Brown Knob Road, Bottle Creek Road, Tallowood Road, and Ghinni Ghi Road all being resheeted with gravel this month.

The list of urban streets in Kyogle which have been repaired is still growing. Between April and mid-July, Council has re-sealed or heavy-patched Harrison Street, Saville Street, Lake View Drive, James Street, Pratt Street, Norledge Street, Fischer Street, Larkin Street, Norton Street, MacDougall Street, Webbs Lane, Bundock Street, Campbell Road, Kindergarten Lane, Irwin Street, Geneva Street, Boorabee Street, Hurley Lane, Colin Street, Plant Street, Ettrick Street, Riverbend Close, Fairy Street, Mount Street, Groom Street,

Stratheden Street, Roxy Lane, Geneva Street, Morphett Street, Crockford Lane, Irwin Street, Rous Street, Earl Street, Edward Lane, Chauvel Street, and Wyangarie Street.

Delivering these works on schedule has been challenging with contractor availability difficulties and disturbance of aging Council water infrastructure. In some cases, old, redundant water mains were discovered during excavation for road works and despite no longer being used to deliver water to properties, the pipes were still connected to the town water supply, meaning that road work was held up while the pipes were capped off and removed.

In addition to delaying completion of road work, this also involved temporary water supply interruptions which inconvenienced residents and business operators as well as Council staff.

Council is very grateful to the community for their patience during this trying time. We very much look forward to having these projects completed for you.

In rural areas, pothole patching was carried out in July on Gradys Creek Road, Lions Road, Kyogle Road, Lillian Rock Road, Clarence Way, Cawongla Road and Oxbow Road.

Landslip sites have been remediated recently at Atkins Road, Back Creek Road, Lynches Creek Road, Williams Road, and Kyogle Road. Work is underway to stabilise and repair a slip site on Gradys Creek Road and work will commence at the end of July to repair major landslips on Lions Road.

PLEA TO ACT to protect local koalas

Friends of the Koala is deeply concerned about the alarming rise in the number of koala car hits in the region. Over the past month, Friends of the Koala has witnessed a distressing surge in koala car hits across the Northern Rivers, with six koalas dying due to vehicle strikes in just one week. Koalas are renowned for their docile nature and slow movement, making them particularly susceptible to vehicle collisions.

Friends of the Koala is calling upon all residents, visitors, and motorists in the Northern Rivers region to be mindful of the presence of koalas on or near roads. If an accident does happen, stop and call the Friends of the Koala 24/7 rescue team. Stay with the animal if you can, until a qualified and licensed rescuer can attend. If you are unable to stay, please be as specific as possible about the location. Do not touch or try to transport koalas yourself as this could pose a significant risk to their health and safety.

The organisation offers the following recommendations:

1. Reduce speed: wildlife is often difficult to spot from a distance, especially at night, and can cross the road unexpectedly. Lowering your speed will give you more time to react and avoid collisions.

2. Be cautious: Pay extra attention when driving through areas identified as wildlife habitat, or where signage indicates recent sightings.

3. Report every koala you see close to a road immediately, whether they appear healthy, injured or dead.

4. If you can, stay with the animal until a rescuer attends. If you cannot stay, try to be as exact as possible about the location: specific addresses, GPS points or landmarks are incredibly helpful.

5. Save the phone numbers of Northern Rivers wildlife rescue organisations in your phone, so you are ready to report any sightings

ROUS CLAIMS victory over Cecropia weed

Rous County Council's weed biosecurity team has a good news story in its fight to eliminate the Cecropia weed tree (*Cecropia* spp.) from the Northern Rivers.

The team has been working tirelessly over the last couple of years to eradicate the weed tree before it caused irreversible damage to the local ecosystems.

Their work has included a program of diligent identification, mapping and control works of more than 100 trees.

Rous is pleased to announce its weed biosecurity team is currently working to eradicate the last few remaining trees, Rous has reached its goal, of no known established Cecropia left on the Far North Coast.

What a win!

Cecropia, also known as Mexican Bean Tree, is a fast growing, ornamental tree native to tropical Central America and the West Indies, that has the potential to invade local rainforests and riparian areas.



Rous County Council has had a major victory in its fight to eradicate the Cecropia or Mexican Bean Tree, pictured., from the Northern Rivers.

Cecropia thrives in wetter habitats and will form dense colonies in forest gaps and margins, roadsides and gullies.

Each tree produces up to 20,000 seed per year which can be spread by fruit bats, birds, flowing water and the movement of soil. If they become established, these monocultures are devastating to native

species of flora and fauna.

Cecropia is a regional priority eradication weed under the *NSW Biosecurity Act 2015*.
