

# Flood recovery a priority FOR COUNCIL

Kyogle Council has emerged from the most challenging period ever faced by the organisation and its people having completed more than \$88 million in flood damage and capital works in a 12-month period, Mayor Cr Kylie Webster (Thomas) said at the release of Council's Annual Report.

Following the catastrophic 2022 floods, Council was faced with a massive flood repair program and a worrying shortage of resources to undertake the rebuild and recovery.

"That meant Council had to be innovative in the way it worked and prepared to adapt quickly to the changing circumstances," Cr Webster said.

"The success of this strategy can be seen in the record-breaking amount of work we've been able to complete in the 12 months to July 2023."

The \$88 million works program completed is \$61 million more than the previous record of \$27 million set in 2021/2022.



In the 12 months to July 1, Council replaced a staggering 32 bridges . That equate to 2.6 bridges replaced every month.

Cr Webster said Council's financial position remained strong despite the challenges generated by the floods.

"We are in a good position going forward, with money in the bank and grants coming in at a higher than expected rate," she said.

"It's been an extremely challenging time for everyone, and on behalf of the Councillors, I want to thank our valuable staff. Even during the flood restoration works program, Council staff exceeded expectations and continued to deliver a high level of service to the various communities in our shire.

"The Council would also like to acknowledge the community for their support and understanding during this challenging period and thank the many

people who have taken the time to contact Council and thank staff for their efforts.

"As challenging as last financial year was, Council has once again proved it's ability to punch well above its weight."

Cr Webster also thanked her fellow Councillors for their support and acknowledged the important role they played in setting the strategic priorities and providing the resources needed to overcome the challenges of the past 18 months.

The annual report, which is available on Council's website, provides details of Council's operations over the 2022-2023 financial year including a summary of achievements.

#### Achievements include:

- A total of 32 timber bridges replaced with concrete or steel structures – 29 bridges replaced under the Fixing Country Bridges Program, two bridges jointly funded by Fixing Country Bridges and the Bridge Renewal Program and one bridge completed under the Kyoqle Page Bridge Package;
- 15.3km of sealed roads rehabilitated;
- 409.4km of roads re-sheeted/ graded, which includes the emergency works associated with

- the February 2022 floods and natural disaster;
- More than 59,000 potholes patched;
- Initial sealing of 1km section of Dyraaba Road completed under the Fixing Local Roads Program;
- Collins Creek Road initial seal to Tims Lane completed using a combination of flood damage and Council co-contributions to build back better;
- 1,185.04 tonnes of material recycled
- 33,568 visits to Kyogle library
- Continued support of the Kyogle Writers Festival, Pumpkin Festival and a series of other events across the LGA;
- Bonalbo Caravan Park refurbishment completed;
- 42,620 pool attendances;
- Purchasing of land at Tabulam for future water and sewerage treatment plants;
- Implemented a new three-bin waste collection service for general waste, recyclables and food and organics waste including community education campaign;
- Adopted the Flying-fox Camp Management Plan and developed protocols for managing extreme weather incidents and works near the flying-fox camp;
- Successful in securing \$200,000

- grant from the Environmental Trust and LGNSW to create 4.7 hectares of flying-fox habitat north of the Kyogle Recreation Reserve;
- Installed three separate displays in Kyogle to showcase the Sinclair Collection – a substantial collection of minerals, crystals and fossils gifted to Council by the family of the late Lloyd and Glenys Sinclair;
- Continuing marketing of the 'Kyogle Up for It' campaign to promote tourism and visitors to the Kyogle LGA;
- Eleven exhibitions held in the Roxy Gallery showcasing local artists and ten exhibitions in the 'Steppin' Up Gallery' to support young, emerging artists and artists living with a disability;
- KMI Hall Supper Room improvements completed;
- Secured betterment funding for Grieves Crossing and the Clarence Way to allow for building back better post natural disaster;
- Mobile phone blackspot mapping completed across the LGA.
- 91 development applications approved with a total value of \$15.64 million;
- Partnering with Tweed Shire Council to progress the Northern Rivers Feral Deer Prevention Program.



### New 3 bin service delivers WASTE SAVINGS

There was a marked reduction in the amount of waste going to landfill in the first three months of Council's new 3-bin waste collection service.

Council has analysed waste data for the first three months of the service and has found that residents and businesses are doing a great job at sorting their waste into the right bin.

In 2022/23, prior to the introduction of the 3-bin service, an average of 81.54 tonnes of waste was being landfilled each month.

In the first three months of the new service, the monthly average has dropped to 50.86 tonnes. This means the monthly average has decreased by 30.68 tonnes or 37.6%.


By reducing the amount of waste going to landfill, the community is reducing the impact on the environment, and saving thousands of dollars in taxes Council has to pay to the NSW Government each month.

Under the State Government's waste levy, Council has to pay the government \$94 for every tonne of waste that ends up in the Kyogle Landfill Facility. Based on the reduction in waste landfilled compared to last year's figures, Council has already saved almost \$4,500 in just three months.

While the results are pleasing so far, Council is encouraging residents and businesses to do even better and further reduce the amount of waste being landfilled each month.

You can reduce your waste by:

Making sure ALL your food scraps and garden wastes are going into the



green-lid food and garden organics bin. Remember – if it can go on your plate, it can go into your green-lid

- Ensuring ALL recyclable materials are going into the yellow-lid recycling bin. Remember to look for the Australasian Recycling Label on packaging and follow the instructions to make sure you are recycling everything you can.
- Using the Community Recycling Centre and Recycling Stations to recycle household wastes like batteries, light bulbs, printer cartridges, mobile phones, eyeglasses, cooking and motor oils, paint, smoke alarms, fire extinguishers, gas canisters and xrays - it's free!

Remember to refer to the brochures and fridge magnets included in 3-bin information pack to help sort your waste correctly.

If you are not sure whether something belongs in your red, yellow or green-lid bin, you can also check out Council's new waste webpage which includes an A-Z guide on what can be placed in each bin and videos about how to recycle right.


Council is proving to be a leading light in climate change adaption.

# Reduce your festive **FOOTPRINT**

Christmas is a time of giving, sharing and creating memories with family and friends. It's also the time of year we tend to go a little overboard; buying gifts, food and other festive items we didn't really need or that were bought purely for the purpose of 'having something to give'.

On average, our waste increases 30 per cent over the festive season, with wrapping paper, packaging, and uneaten food being the main offenders.

It's estimated that our country generates 125,000 tonnes of plastic packaging waste alone and makes its way through 150,000kms of wrapping paper! Here are some ideas to help you reduce your festive footprint:

- 1. Consider using reusable fabric, pictured above, or card gift bags instead of wrapping paper. You can reuse the bags year after year, and they can also save you a lot of headaches trying to wrap odd-shaped presents and the inevitable battle with the sticky-tape!
- Try making your own Christmas bon-bons using an empty toilet or kitchen



paper roll, fabric and ribbon. You can fill the bon-bons with something special for your guests (instead of those little plastic figurines that end up in the bin anyway) and reuse the materials again year after year.

- Plan your menu and only buy what food you need. If you cook too much food, then why not ask your guests to bring containers so they can take home any leftovers.
- H. Make sure that all food scraps go into your greenlid FOGO bin, including meat, bones, seafood and prawn shells. If you are concerned about odours, freeze the scraps in a Council approved compostable kitchen caddy liner until bin night.
- 5. If you are gifting battery-

operated toys or tools, consider buying rechargeable batteries instead of single use ones. And remember to never put flat batteries into any of your kerbside collection bins. Flat batteries can be recycled by dropping them off at the Kyogle Library, Ritchies IGA, Community Recycling Centre at the Kyogle Landfill Facility and the Bonalbo Community Hall.

6. Finally, remember to check the label!! The Australasian Recycling Label has made the process of identifying which household products can go in which bin much easier now. Keep an eye out for the instruction labels on packaging and follow what the label says.

# Four more new bridges **COMPLETED**

Bridge works have been completed on Station Road, Roseberry Creek Road (Comerford Bridge), Baileys Bridge Road and Williams Road (Barker Bridge), with all the bridges now open to traffic.

Crews have started construction works on Brindle Creek Road, Needhams Road (Eight Day Creek), Askews Dip Road, and Gambleys Road bridges together with the replacement of Kyogle Road bridge over Back Creek.

November saw the completion of Stage 2 for the Geneva Bridge Landslip Remediation. Site demobilization is now in progress.

Pavement works have been concluded in Short Street as well as the initial sealing of one section on Sextonville Road near the Richmond Valley Council boundary.

Construction crews have started work on the first three sections of the Clarence Way upgrade, between Bonalbo and Urbenville.

Work on the full project between Sandilands and Urbenville is expected to continue until mid 2025.

Pothole patching has been focused on the Gradys Creek, Clarence Way and Fawcetts Plains catchments. Vegetation crews have been carrying out slashing in the Findon Creek, Bruxner Highway and Gradys Creek catchments.

Landslip restoration continues at Dugan Road, Williams Road, Gabal Road, as well as

the three landslips on Lions Road. The landslip repairs on Edward Lane are expected to be completed this month.

Of the 106 major landslips which occurred in the Kyogle local government area as a result of the 2022 floods, 38 have now been rehabilitated.



## **PREVENTION IS**

### better than cure with weeds

Eurasian water milfoil (Myriophyllum spicatum) does not currently grow in Australia but it is listed as a prevention weed in the North Coast Regional Strategic Weed Management Plan.

It is now naturalised and a major weed of lakes and reservoirs in North America and if introduced here, it could become a major weed in our region.

The objective of weed prevention is to prevent the species from arriving and establishing in the region.

For this to succeed it is essential that authorities continue to work together in partnership and collaborate with landholders, community members and government stakeholders.

Eurasian water milfoil is a perennial aquatic weed that is mostly submerged except when flowering.

If left unmanaged, it can block waterways, displace native aquatic plants, and reduce fish habitat. It spreads mostly through plant fragments which take root after drifting in water currents.

Growing up to seven meters long, Eurasian water milfoil, *pictured*, produces up to 112 seeds per stalk and seeds may stay dormant for many years. Seeds usually need at least 15°C for germination.

# NEWS IN BREIF

### **Upgrade works complete**

Work to upgrade the general waste drop off area at the Kyogle Landfill Facility is now complete.

During September and October, work was carried out to ensure the public could drop off their general waste safely.

This included installation of new retaining walls, safety railings, foundations for skips bins and sealing the apron to the drop off area so customers have a safer footing when emptying waste from their vehicles into the skip bins.

A huge thanks to all customers for their patience and understanding.

### **Grant for soccer club**

The Kyogle Football Club is set to receive \$20,000 towards improved oval drainage as part of the NSW Government's \$37.2 million Local

Small Commitments Allocation Program.

Member for Lismore Janelle Saffin announced the grant saying it was one of her key election commitments to the Kyogle community.

The Club's grounds are in one of the lowest parts of Kyogle and the upgraded drainage will enable the grounds to be back in action more quickly after heavy rain or flooding in the adjacent Richmond River.

### **Christmas lunch**

The Kyogle Community Christmas Luncheon for singles and couples alone at Christmas will be held at the Kyogle Community Centre (formerly the Seniors Centre) in Bloore Street, Kyogle on Christmas Day (25 December).

There will be a full roast dinner and desserts as well as lucky door prizes.

Tickets cost \$15 for adults and \$5 for children under 12. No alcohol

permitted.

### **Memorial grants**

Two local war memorials will be upgraded thanks to grants received under the NSW Government's Community War Memorials Fund.

The Barkers Vale Public School will receive \$9,450 to carry out works on the Barkers Vale War Memorial. The work will include repairs to the steps and mortar, cleaning of marble tables and flagpole supports.

Mallanganee Memorial Hall has been allocated \$9,979 for conservation works to the hall, including timberwork, plumbing and fire doors, and the provision of disabled access.

## Fun for all at family **FESTIVAL**

The Summerland Giant Pumpkin and Watermelon Festival will be held in Kyogle on Saturday, 20 January 2024 and everyone is invited to come along and enjoy a fun-filled family day.

The action will centre on Stratheden Street, where all the amazing giant pumpkins and watermelons will be on display.

This year's event is expected to attract entries from throughout the Northern Rivers and South East Queensland, with hopes high that a new Australian record for the heaviest pumpkin will be set.

Festival goers will also be able to check out the other giant vegetables entered in the Home Gardner Competition, enjoy live music, and be entertained by street performers.

And if that's not enough for the family, there will be artisan market stalls, the ever popular Farmers Market, watermelon eating and gumboot throwing competitions, and train trips, courtesy of the Rail Motor Society, to Glennapp via the Border loop and Casino.

Train tickets will again be available on The Rail Motor Society website in January.

In the lead up to the festival, entries in the Still Life Painting Prize will be displayed at Council's Roxy Gallery from 17 January, along with the entries in the Woodworking, and Soft Crafts competitions. Opening night of the exhibition will be 16 January.
